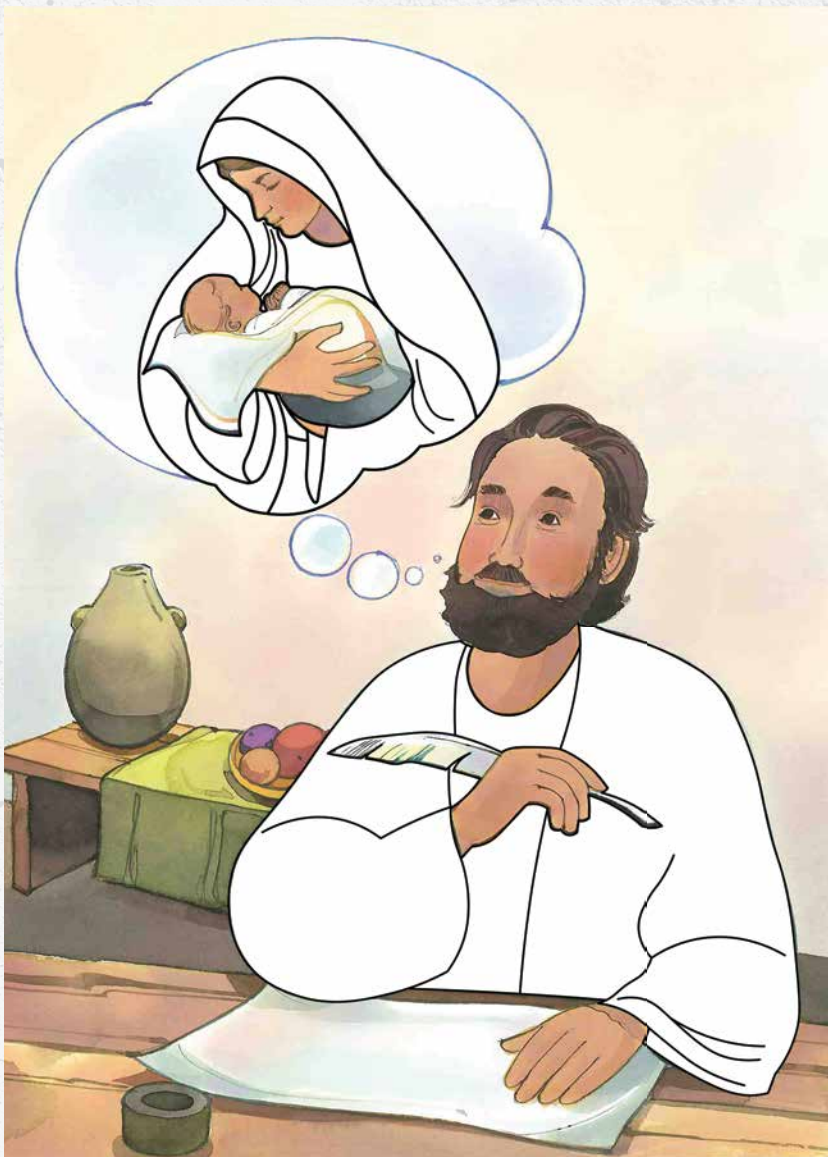

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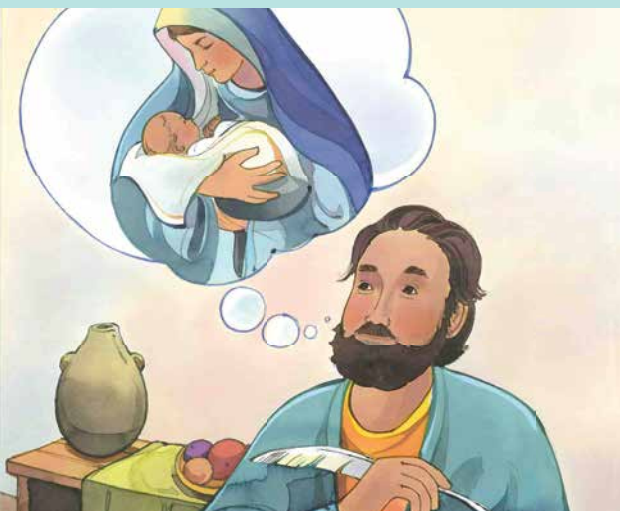

Isaiah Told about Jesus

Isaiah 7:14; 11:1, 2; 35:5, 6a; 50:5, 6; 53:5, 6



God told Isaiah a special name for the baby. The name was "Immanuel." It means "God is with us." God said that His very own Son would come to live on earth. We know His name is Jesus.

Isaiah knew God always keeps His

promises. Isaiah wrote down what God told him so everyone would know God's message. The message is in our Bible in the book called Isaiah.

Isaiah and God's people waited for God to send His Son. For seven hundred years they waited! That is a long, long, long time. People were born, and people died. Isaiah died too. God's Son did not come. But the people knew God is faithful. He does what He says He will do when He wants to do it. The people knew God kept His promises, so they waited . . . and waited . . . and waited. ❄️

Isaiah was a prophet who lived in Israel during the time of the kings. He told God's messages about what would happen in the future. God Himself spoke to the prophets. Isaiah knew God promised to send a Savior to take care of our sins, but Isaiah did not know when this Person would come. Isaiah knew God's promises always come true.

One day God told Isaiah how He would send the Savior. He said He would send a baby to a young woman who was not married. The baby would be God's Son.

Reminder Scroll

Isaiah wrote God's message on a scroll. Help your child make a reminder scroll.

- 2 paper towel tubes.
- Roll of brown craft paper or large grocery bag.
- Craft glue, scissors, pencil, colored pencils.
- Paper to fit the center of the scroll.
- Ribbon, raffia, or yarn.
- Feather (optional).

Trim the grocery bag or craft paper to fit the tubes. Cut a good length. Let your child add the glue to the tubes as you roll the paper to align with the tube ends. Set aside to dry. On a separate piece of paper, print the following for your child to trace with a colored pencil or crayon: God keeps His promises.

He may decorate the sides. Glue or tape to the center of the scroll. Show your child how to roll the scroll from both ends, tie with a ribbon, and add a feather.



Growth at Home

Help your child understand that the names Immanuel, Savior, Jesus, and God's Son all refer to the same person.

Reinforce the truth that God knows your child, and Jesus is his personal Savior. Jesus was sent to take away everyone's sin.

When you are helping your child learn Isaiah 53:6, let him substitute the word "sin" for the word "iniquity."

INIQUITY = SIN

Help your child define the pronoun "him" as Jesus.

Measurables

Look for the following indicators that your child understands the prophecy in Isaiah.

1. My child knows that a prophet is a man who tells God's messages.
2. My child realizes that God kept His promise to send the Savior.
3. My child understands that the promised Savior is Jesus.
4. My child is learning that God always keeps His promises.
