Notes to the Teacher

1. This book has been prepared for primary children. The book is perforated so you can tear out each sheet, complete it in class, and send it home with the child. Each page includes directions for completing the activities on that page.
2. The parent letter is on page 3. Send this page home with the child on the first Sunday of the quarter or deliver it personally before the quarter begins. Page 4 contains an overview of this quarter's lessons, along with a list of all the memory verses.
3. If a child is absent, make sure he receives his handwork sheet and the Strong Kids at Home take-home paper. This will help him review the Bible lesson he missed.

Using the Handwork Sheets

The first page of each lesson contains a Lesson Review section. This is an opportunity to review the previous week's lesson. As children arrive to class, let them work on the activity about five minutes into class time. Make sure the children's names are on their papers before you collect them.

You will use the handwork sheets again at the end of the lesson. The children will work on the activities on the back of the sheets. As they work, discuss the Bible story or its application. Let children do as much as time permits, but if they cannot complete the page in class, allow them to take it home and finish it.

Thank you for bringing your child to Sunday School!

The winter quarter study for primary-age students will help your child learn important truths about knowing, loving, and serving God. Your child will study the life of Ruth, as well as the first kings of Israel, all of whom learned lessons about obeying and honoring God. He will know that God selflessly loves and cares for him, which will encourage him to trust and obey God.

The first unit focuses on Ruth and how God took care of Ruth and Naomi. Your child will see the way God worked in Ruth's life to provide for her physical needs. He will also learn how Ruth and Boaz's marriage was part of God's plan to continue the family line that would eventually result in Jesus' birth.

In the second unit, the lessons will look at Hannah, King Saul, King David, and King Solomon. Each account presents the blessings or disastrous results of each individual's obedience or lack thereof. Your child will learn to seek God and go to His Word for wisdom.

Each week take time to discuss your child's worksheet with him and encourage him to tell you what he has learned. Help him memorize his Bible memory verse, listed on the back of this sheet. He will receive a verse sticker to place on his attendance chart when he recites the verse the following week.

Don't forget about the Strong Kids at Home take-home paper your child brings home every week. Each paper contains an application story, a Bible lesson review, and fun activities related to the Bible lesson. Review the Parent Connect section so you can continue your child's learning throughout the week.

Quarter Overview

The King of Kings Weeks 1—4

Unit 1 introduces students to Ruth and the way God provided for her needs. They will realize Ruth's example of selfless love for Naomi is a picture of God's selfless love for us. Students will learn how, ultimately, God would direct Ruth's life to become part of the family line through which Jesus was born.

The Kings of Israel Weeks 5—13

In unit 2, students will study serving and obeying God. Through the lives of Hannah, Saul, David, and Solomon, students will understand that God desires our full obedience. They will see how God keeps His promises to bless those who obey Him and to punish those who disobey. Students will learn to apply God's wisdom to their own lives.

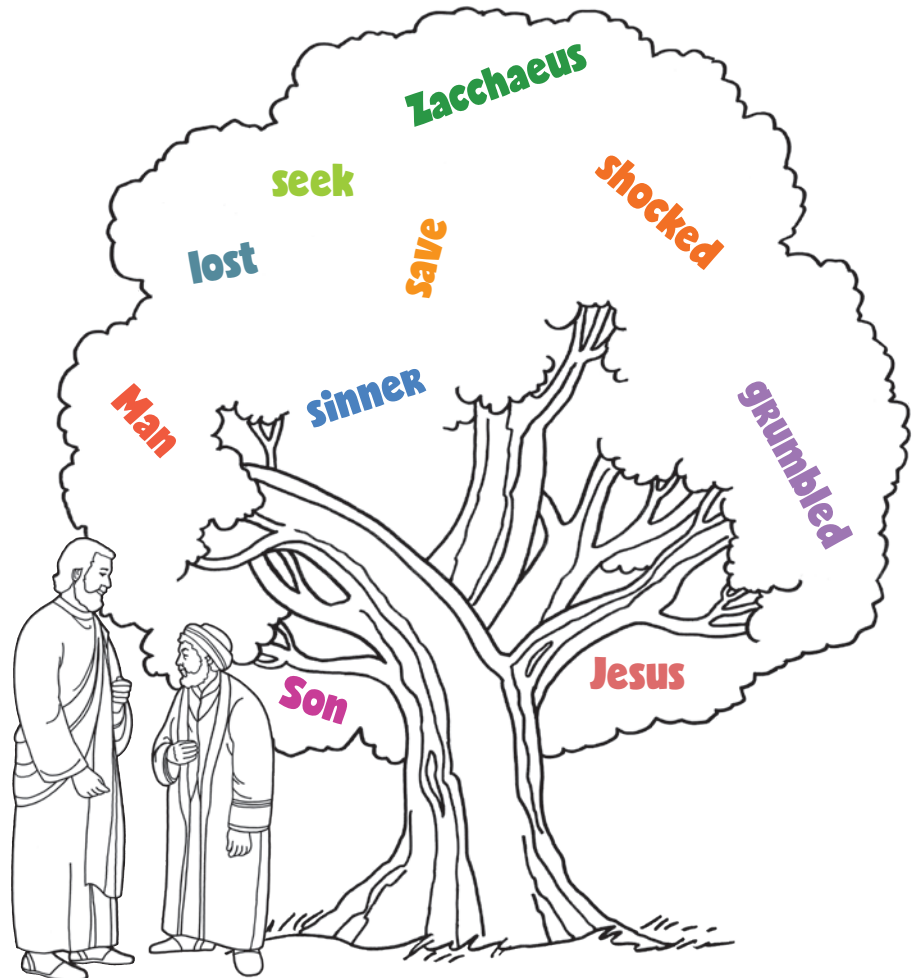

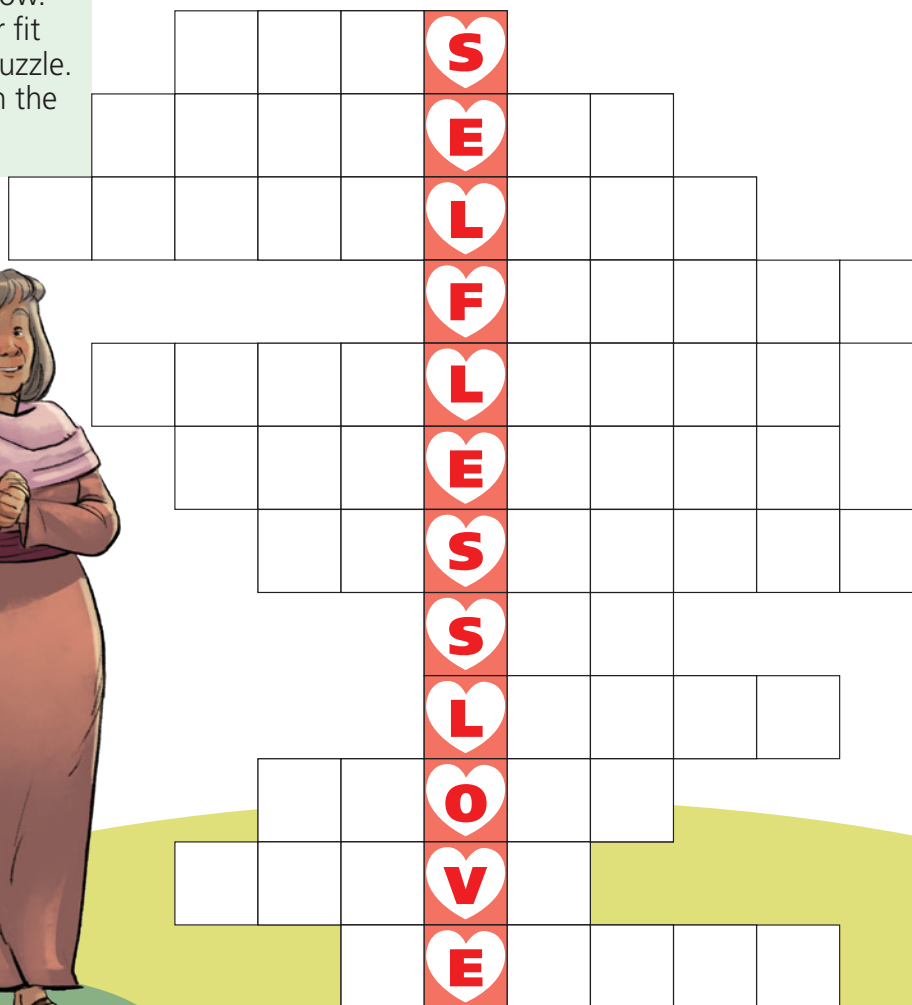
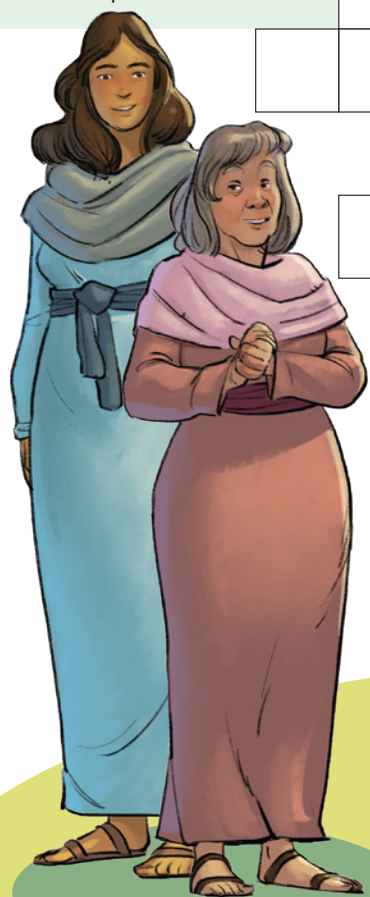
Ruth's Selfless Love

Because of the famine in Bethlehem, Elimilech moved his family to the pagan city of Moab. There his two **SONS** married two Moabite women: Ruth and Orpah. But **TRAGEDY** struck when **ELIMILECH** and both sons died. Naomi was left without a husband or sons to care for her. When Naomi heard that the **FAMINE** had ended, she decided to return to **BETHLEHEM**. Naomi's two daughters-in-law wanted to go with her. "Oh, no, my daughters," Naomi pleaded. "Stay here in your **HOMELAND**. Return to your own families. You can find new **HUSBANDS** here. God has dealt bitterly with me." The three women cried together. Their hearts were deeply **SAD**. Orpah took Naomi's advice and returned to Moab. But Ruth **LOVED** Naomi. She was determined to stay with **NAOMI**. "Please, don't ask me to **LEAVE**," Ruth said. "Wherever you go, I will go. Your people will be my **PEOPLE**. Your God will be my God." So Ruth continued with Naomi to Bethlehem.
