Preparing for the Journey "Are We There Yet?"

If you have ever traveled with a young child, you have encountered the questions, "When are we going to get there?" "Are we there yet?" "How much longer is it?" Or perhaps your child's grandparents are coming to visit, which requires a different set of responses: "When are they going to get here?" "How long will they be here?" "Where will they sleep?" "Can I go home with them?"



We all must admit that when we travel, we don't know exactly what will happen. The plane may be cancelled. The car may break down. The place where we usually stop for lunch is closed.

The last unit of the summer quarter has three lessons on end times. This is a topic that is not usually taught in preschool departments, but it is important to begin to lay a foundation of future events and introduce the vocabulary associated with that time.

God tells us much about the future events of His timeline, in the Old Testament as well as the New Testament. Your students will ask many questions about this new topic. Familiarize yourself with each lesson in unit 3 and the Scripture references so you can answer students from the Bible.

Your students trust you to have an answer for everything. Unfortunately, you won't be able to answer some of them. Be honest, but always reassuring. And always take the opportunity to present salvation. Be prepared to share the gospel. Read "God's Plan for Salvation" on the next page.

"When will you die?" I don't know, but I have asked Jesus to be my Savior, so I am ready.

"When is Jesus coming back?" No one knows, but He said He would, and He always does what He says. He keeps His promises.

"Who gets to go to Heaven?" Only people who believe in Jesus and have asked Him to be their Savior from sin.

"How can I be sure I will go to Heaven?" If you have told Jesus you are sorry for your sin (all the bad things you do) and asked Jesus to be your Savior, then when He comes, you will be ready.

"How long will we be in Heaven?" Jesus said we would be with Him forever, that means all the time.

"What will we do in Heaven?" We will sing for Jesus a lot and tell Him we love Him. We will talk to people from the Bible, like Moses and Joshua and Mary and Peter. You will see your friends who believe in Jesus too.

The answer is in God's Word, the Bible.

Admit that you are a sinner.

We are all sinners; we all do wrong things (Romans 3:23). God is perfect. He must punish sin (Romans 6:23). We cannot get to Heaven by trying to be good (Ephesians 2:8, 9). God showed His love for us by sending His Son, Jesus, to die for us (Romans 5:8).

Believe Who Jesus is and what Jesus did.

Jesus is God's Son Who came to earth and was the only One ever to live a perfect life. He died on the cross to take the punishment for sin. He was buried and rose from the dead (1 Corinthians 15:3, 4). God promises eternal life to all who believe on the Lord Jesus Christ (Acts 16:31; Romans 6:23).

Choose to trust in Jesus.

Believe that Jesus, God's Son, took the punishment for your sin. Trust Jesus as your Savior, knowing that He is the only way you can have your sin forgiven and become a child of God.

When you trust Jesus as Savior, God forgives your sin. He makes you part of His family (John 1:12) and promises you a home in Heaven with Him forever (John 14:2, 3).

Teacher Preparation

Take time to read the Scripture Focus for today, Acts 1:4, 5, 8; 2:1–11. Review the promise in John 15:26—16:14.


The concept of the Holy Spirit is a difficult concept for young children. Your students are just beginning to move from concrete ideas to those that are not concrete. Be patient with them and their understanding of the Holy Spirit. Prepare yourself to answer their questions according to Scripture. Show them in your Bible what Jesus said about the "Comforter."

Sometimes we fail to acknowledge the *power* of the indwelling Holy Spirit to do the ministry He has set before us. We forget that we have God Himself in us. The same God that created and sustains the universe is living in each believer. How foolish we are to think we can do anything in our own strength or without His enablement. Thank God for sending the Holy Spirit. Ask Him to help you explain the Holy Spirit (Comforter) to your class.

Note: Students relate the words "spirit" and "ghost" to Halloween. It is best to use the term Holy Spirit—rather than Holy Ghost or just "Spirit"—as you teach. Remind students that Jesus called the Holy Spirit the Comforter.

Attendance and Verse

Distribute an attendance and verse chart (22928) to each student. Have students write their names on their charts. Today the students will place the orange tent sticker over the 1. Mount the charts on a wall or bulletin board at students' eye level. Next week, students will add a camping equipment sticker for reciting Acts 1:8, the memory verse for this week.



Session Starters

Option 1—Keep It Up!

Gather

- Balloons (variety of colors).
- Colored copy paper or card stock.
- Large play area.

Steps

- 1. Before class, blow up several balloons. Make several paper fans from colored copy paper (accordion-folded) or secure sheets of card stock to wave as a fan.
- 2. Take your class to a large indoor play area.
- 3. Group students into teams (or pairs). Determine this by class size.
- 4. Explain the activity.

I am going to give each team a balloon. Your job is to work together to keep the balloon from touching the ground for as long as possible. But you may not *touch* the balloon! You must only keep the balloon afloat with wind power! You may fan the balloon or blow on the balloon, but you may not touch it! Just use wind power! If your team's balloon falls to the ground, your team is out and must go sit down.

- 5. Let teams practice for a few minutes to figure out strategies to keep the balloon afloat.
- 6. Transition to the lesson.

ASK: What is wind? Discuss this for a minute or two. Listen to students' thoughts. Help them realize that wind is moving air.

Wind is moving air. Sometimes the wind is gentle. Sometimes it is strong.

ASK: Can you see the wind? *No. Wind is invisible.*

ASK: How do you know the wind is there? We can see what it does.

We can't see the wind, but we can see what it does. I know the wind is there because I can see its power.

Today we are going to learn about the coming of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is God, but the Holy Spirit does not have a body. We cannot see the Holy Spirit with our eyes, but we can see what the Holy Spirit *does.* By faith we believe what God's Word says about His Holy Spirit. In our lesson today, the Holy Spirit demonstrates His power in a mighty way.

Option 2—Watch the Wind

Gather

- Cotton balls or pom-pom craft balls (same size for each team).
- Drinking straws.
- Masking tape.
- Two tables or floor spaces (same sizes).

Steps

- 1. Before class, prepare for two teams. Each team needs their own identical space, so a table for each team works well. Otherwise, use a floor space. Tape off a start line and a finish line. Line up an equal number of cotton balls or pom-poms on the start line for each team.
- 2. As students come to class, group them into two teams. Give each student a straw and explain the game.

When I say "go," use your straw to blow as many cotton balls across the finish line as possible. You may not touch the cotton ball (pom-pom). You may not push the cotton ball with the straw. You may only blow through the straw to make the ball move. If the cotton ball falls on the floor, it doesn't count! At the end of one minute, we will see which team got the most cotton balls across the finish line!

- 3. Play the game two or three times, if time permits.
- 4. Declare a champion team and award a small prize or piece of wrapped candy (optional).
- 5. Transition to the lesson.

ASK: Did anyone see the air or wind coming out of the ends of your straws? *No.*

ASK: Who could see what the wind did? Everyone should acknowledge the balls were moved by the wind.

Yes, you all could see the *results* of the air blowing out of the end of your straw. We can't see the wind or air coming out of the straw, but we can see what it does. We believe the air is there because we can see its power.

Today we are going to learn about the coming of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is God, but the Holy Spirit does not have a body. We cannot see the Holy Spirit with our eyes, but we can see what the Holy Spirit *does*. By faith we believe what God's Word says about His Holy Spirit. In our lesson today, the Holy Spirit demonstrates His power in a mighty way.

Transition

- 1. Instruct students to help you clean up.
- 2. Sing a song about helping or serving as you work.
- 3. Guide students to your story time area for the Bible lesson. The teaching visuals and the Bible time teacher should already be in the designated Bible story area.
- 4. Fold your hands and bow your head as a cue to the students that you are going to pray. Thank God for bringing you together today. Ask Him to help you teach and to help the students listen, learn, and obey.

Bible Study

The Church's Power (Acts 1:4, 5, 8; 2:1–11)

Gather

- Teaching picture 49-1 from resource kit #1249.
- Teaching picture 44-11 from resource CD #1249. Print from CD.
- CDs or DVDs of people speaking in other languages.
- CD or DVD player.

After Jesus' resurrection, He spent forty days on earth. He appeared to hundreds of people. Jesus ate with them, He preached, and He told them to share the good news of forgiveness of sin through His death and resurrection. One day, Jesus gathered His followers together on a mountaintop and spoke to them again about what He wanted them to do.

(Show picture 44-11.) Jesus had promised to come back, but He instructed the disciples to wait in Jerusalem for the coming of the Holy Spirit. From the Holy Spirit, they would receive power to preach and teach about Jesus all over the world. As they all watched, Jesus ascended up, UP, UP through the clouds, back to His Father in Heaven.

After this happened, two angels appeared and reassured the disciples that Jesus would come back.

The believers went to Jerusalem to wait. As the days passed, Jesus' followers stayed together. They ate together; they prayed together; they talked about all the things Jesus had taught them and the amazing things they had seen. Then one day something suddenly happened.

READ: Acts 2:1, 2.

ASK: What filled the room? *The sound of a mighty rushing wind.*

ASK: Where does the Bible say it came from? *Heaven*.

ACTIVITY: What would that sound like? Can we work together to sound like rushing wind? Let's try. Invite students to make "swooshing" and "shhhhh" sounds together. Practice starting softer and getting louder and louder.

They did not see the wind; they heard the sound of wind. It was not a little breeze. It was a *mighty* rushing wind all over the house. Perhaps the believers looked out the doors and windows. Was it a storm? No! God was keeping His promise: He had sent the Holy Spirit!

READ: Acts 2:3.

Then something else happened right after that.

ASK: What appeared above each believer's head? A flame of fire!

(Show picture 49-1.) The flames of fire were a way to show the people what God was doing. The fire did not hurt the people. The Bible says the flame just *appeared* above each believer's head.

READ: Acts 2:4a.

ASK: Who had come? *The Holy Spirit!*

Jesus had promised His followers that He would send the Comforter. That is what Jesus called the Holy Spirit. The flame of fire above each believer's head showed that the Holy Spirit had come and was living in each person.

Then God worked an incredible miracle through the believers who were now filled with the Holy Spirit.


READ: Acts 2:4b.

The Bible says that through the power of the Holy Spirit, the believers were each able to speak in languages that they did not know. These were not made-up words. The disciples were able to talk about Jesus and other people could understand what they said.

ACTIVITY: Play videos of a variety of languages so your students can hear different dialects and accents.

people in your church, let them recite John 3:16 or talk about Jesus in their own language.

Soon, people outside the house began to wonder what was going on inside! They heard sounds of excitement! A large crowd gathered and what they heard astonished them.

READ: Acts 2:7, 8.

ASK: What did the people in the crowd hear? *They heard the* disciples speaking in languages that they had never said before.

READ: Acts 2:11.

Egyptians, Arabs, Romans, people from the island of Crete, and many other people could understand the disciples. At last they could learn about Jesus. God had chosen just the right time for this. All these people from other countries were in Jerusalem for a worship time the Jews called the Feast of Pentecost. They wondered how this happened. We know it was the power of the Holy Spirit.

If you have believed Jesus as your Savior, you have the help of the Holy Spirit living within you too. The Holy Spirit immediately comes to live in each person who believes in Jesus as Savior. You will not see a flame of fire over your head, but you will know how He is helping you.

He helps each believer live in a way that pleases God. He helps believers show love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, and gentleness to others. The Holy Spirit helps us understand the Bible. He gives us wisdom to obey God's Word. The Holy Spirit gives us the power to share the gospel with others.

PRAY: Thank God for sending the Holy Spirit as Jesus promised.

Memory Builder

Gather

Verse poster 49-A from resource kit #1249.

Steps

- 1. Display verse poster 49-A.
- 2. Read Acts 1:8 from your open Bible. Then read the verse from the poster as you point to each word.
- 3. Read the sentence at the top of poster. Discuss.

Jesus made this promise to the believers right before He ascended back up to Heaven. Only believers in Jesus receive the Holy Spirit.

ASK: What did Jesus promise all believers would receive? Why






When you discuss the "power" of the Holy Spirit, make sure the children don't misunderstand this as "magical power." Preschoolers may have trouble distinguishing between fantasy they see on TV or DVDs and reality. Associate the Holy Spirit's "power" with the word "help."

ASK: Where does this strength or ability come from? (Point to the words "Holy Ghost [Spirit].") *The Holy Spirit gives it to each person who trusts Jesus for salvation.*

4. Teach these actions and sign language to help students learn the verse.

Gather

- Lesson 1 student book page and stickers (5 flames and 3 Holy Spirit clouds) for each student.
- Coloring and writing supplies.
- Strong Kids at Home take-home paper and outer wrap.

Steps

- 1. Direct students to tables. Provide a student book page for lesson 1 and the stickers for each child.
- 2. Provide necessary supplies for the students to complete the page.
- 3. Read the directions and discuss the elements on both pages. Discuss the word "power" on page 2. Emphasize that the Holy Spirit only comes to believers.
- 4. Recite Acts 1:8 as students work.
- 5. Let students explain their pictures of how they are serving.
- 6. Distribute any crafts students made and the *Strong Kids at Home* take-home paper and cover wrap (for parents) to students who are leaving the room at this time.
- 7. Pray and close the session with a song about God's goodness and greatness.
