Strength For Real Life

Monday

Do you ever feel completely clueless about how to handle a situation or even where to turn for help? This quarter you'll study about several hard-to-handle areas of your life, and you'll discover that the answers for these hard problems are all in the Bible: God's Word to you.

"According as his divine power hath given unto us all things that pertain unto life and godliness, through the knowledge of him that hath called us to glory and virtue" (2 Peter 1:3).

God's Vord by Stan Lightfoot

God designed the Bible to reveal Himself and to help us live our lives as He intended. That means it should help us in our day-to-day actions and decisions. Does it? I asked the teens at our church to tell me how the Bible helps them in several areas of life. Here are their answers.

How does the Bible help you at home?

"It helps me to forgive my brothers and sisters when they do stuff that hurts me (Matthew 18:21, 22). It also teaches me to support them and encourage them when they're feeling bad (1 Thessalonians 5:11)."

"The Bible says, 'The eyes of the LORD are in every place, [keeping watch on] the evil and the good' (Proverbs 15:3). That helps me when something happens at home that my parents don't see or when I get in trouble for something I didn't do. I know God still knows."

"The Bible says we should obey our parents (Ephesians 6:1, 2). It gives us guidelines that set us apart from the rest of the world. Secularism says that our parents are there just to feed us and take care of us and that we should just do what we want, no matter what they say. The Bible helps me see that differently."

How does the Bible help you at school?

"This week some of the kids at school have been taking advantage of our English teacher because she's having some hearing problems. After a while she got upset and gave the class a lecture on respect, doing their work, and the importance of learning. A lot of my classmates thought her talk was stupid and laughed at her. I thought she was right. The Bible tells us to be kind (Ephesians 4:32) and to respect people like teachers who are in a position of authority (Romans 13:1–7)."

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"A lot of kids don't want to do their homework, and it seems like refusing to work hard at school is the 'in' thing. The kid who does what he is supposed to do is the 'nerd,' and the kid who is disobedient is 'cool.' The Bible helps me see through that (Ephesians 6:5, 6)."

"Sometimes we hear things in class that aren't right, like the stuff about evolution. The Bible helps me know what is right and helps me reject false stuff like evolution. I can refute evolution because I know what the Bible says (Genesis 1-11)."

How does the Bible help you with your friends?

"The Bible changes how you treat your friends. A lot of kids are cruel toward each other. The Bible teaches us to be careful how we use our mouths and to be kind (James 3:1–12; Ephesians 4:32)."

"We won't always be in this world. We'll be going to Heaven someday, so we don't have to worry about what people think of us when we do what God wants us to do (Matthew 6:19–21)."

How does the Bible help you at church?

"We come regularly to church because we know God wants us to be around other believers and learn about Him (Hebrews 10:24, 25)."

"James tells us our tongues can be a big problem and that we need to watch what we say to each other. We need to make sure that when we're joking around we don't hurt each other (James 3:1–12)."

"We know the Bible tells us how to be saved, so we should invite our friends so they will hear the gospel too—kinda like Philip and Nathaniel (John 1:43–46)."

How does the Bible help you on the job?

"Sometimes a boss will ask us to do something we know is wrong. We can

learn from Daniel that when that happens, it's right to take a stand for God and to provide an alternative to the boss that will allow us to do what is right (Daniel 1)."

"My boss isn't my mom and dad or a policeman, but I still need to respect him as an authority God put in my life (Romans 13:1–7; Ephesians 6:5, 6)."

How does the Bible help you on your team?

"My coach is my boss. Even though he makes things hard sometimes, I'm supposed to respect him and follow his lead (Ephesians 6:5, 6)."

"The Bible teaches me to be a good teammate, to be a good sport, to encourage my teammates instead of yelling at them, and to respect my opponents (Romans 12:9–21)."

How does the Bible help you when you are alone?

"Sometimes when I'm alone, it's because I'm angry. Reading the Bible can help me calm down and get my emotions under control."

"The Bible says, 'Be sure your sin will find you out' (Numbers 32:23). Remembering that helps me do what's right even when no one else knows. I know God knows."
