God Provided His Life

Psalm 90:2, 4; Isaiah 40:28; Revelation 1:8

Memory Verse

Bible Story Questions Ask your child these review questions.

- Name something that does not have a beginning or an end.
- Who made God?
- Is there anyone like God?
- What does the word "eternal" mean?
- Because God is so great, what do we need to do?



GINA LOOKS FOR * THE **Beginning** AND THE **End**

Gina looked and looked up in the nighttime sky. It was very dark. She turned to the right and looked. She turned to the left and looked. She turned all the way around and looked some more. But Gina could not find what she was looking for. Her neck was starting to hurt from looking up for so long.

"What are you doing out there in the dark, Gina," said Robert from the doorway. Robert was Gina's big brother. He was seven.

"I'm looking for the beginning and the end of the nighttime sky," said Gina.

Robert came outside and stood on the deck with Gina. He started looking too. They saw the moon and lots of stars. Lots and lots of stars.

"It has to be somewhere," said Robert, very seriously. Robert studied science in his class at school. He knew a lot about everything. Finally, Daddy came outside. "What are you two doing?" he asked.

"We can't find the beginning and the end of the nighttime sky," said Gina and Robert together.

"Only God knows that," said Daddy. "Because He created it, He knows where it starts, and He knows where it ends."

"Is there anything that doesn't have a beginning and an end?" asked Gina.

"I remember the answer to that," said Robert. "Only God has no beginning and no end. The Bible says He is everlasting. That means He is forever and forever and forever and forever and...."

"And I'm glad God is forever, and He will always be here," said Daddy.

"Me too," said Gina. "I'll stop looking at the sky now and just remember only God is forever."

Beginnings and Ends

Look for opportunities to talk with your child about the beginning and end of common things about your home: the beginning and end of a zipper; the beginning and end of a laundry cycle (washer or dryer); the beginning and end of a television program or DVD; the beginning and end of a rain storm. Compare to the fact that God has no beginning and no end. We call that eternal. God is eternal.

Find the path from the little star at the beginning to the big star at the end.



Measuring Growth at Home

The goal of this lesson is to help your child realize that God is to be praised for Who He is—the everlasting God of the universe, our Creator. The word "everlasting" is a hard concept to grasp, even for adults. In our fast-paced society, things change quickly, even in seconds. Take time during a family meal a couple times each week to ask family members what they saw or thought about that reminded them of the everlasting, eternal God. Work together to verbalize a praise sentence for that experience; e.g., "I praise God that He was with me all day today. And He will be with me tomorrow." "I praise God that His faithfulness will last forever." "I praise God that the sun and moon are always there."



Measurables

Look for the following indicators that your child is beginning to understand God's eternality.


- **1.** My child thanks God for always being with him.
- 2. My child understands that the word "eternal" means "forever."
- **3.** My child realizes that God is forever.
