





If you have a bulletin board available in your classroom, the following are specific ways to use your bulletin board throughout the quarter.

Description of Physical, Social, and Emotional Development

- ALLOW enough time for activities and crafts so students do not feel rushed and become frustrated.
- REMIND students of expected classroom behavior keep your hands to yourself, respect the personal space of others, listen, and pay attention.
- ENCOURAGE students to get to know one another; provide opportunities for them to talk.
- COMPLIMENT achievement with brief, verbal praise.

Effective Instructional Methods

- LISTEN carefully to students' ideas about God and the Bible; correct misunderstandings with simple, kind responses.
- EMPHASIZE reverence, love, and obedience for God and His Word.
- TALK with students about salvation. This is the age when many children accept Christ.
- BUILD on what the students already know about God and the Bible and on concepts from the previous lesson. (This requires you to know your students.)
- CONTINUE giving guided instruction while giving opportunities for basic independent problem solving.
- ENCOURAGE students to briefly explain their answers or opinions.


Teacher Preparation

- ☐ Read Leviticus 19:2; Isaiah 14:12–15; Ezekiel 28:13–19.
- ☐ Holiness is probably the greatest of all God's attributes. It influences all He is and does. It filters into each of His other attributes. We cannot study God without exploring His holiness.
- ☐ Holiness means that God cannot tolerate sin. He hates it and won't permit it in His presence. God set this precedent when He cast Lucifer out of Heaven. God must judge sin.
- □ When we begin to realize God's holiness, we sense our own sinfulness and need for salvation. To think that a perfect and pure God would sacrifice His own beloved Son to save wretched sinners is beyond our comprehension. But He did, and we can receive salvation if we will place our faith and trust in Jesus.

Session Starters

Option 1—Clean vs. Dirty

Gather

- Several clean, white items (e.g., white towel, white sheet of paper, cotton balls, a white china plate).
- Jelly or other spreadable food item.
- Spoon.

Steps

1. Display all the clean items.

ASK: What do all these items have in common? *They are all clean.*

2. Display the jelly. Open it and smear jelly on each item. If desired, enlist the students' help. Smear a tiny dot on the cotton ball, a small streak on the sheet of paper, a big smudge on the white towel, and a large smear across the plate.

ASK: What did I do to the items? You got all of them dirty.

ASK: Are any of them dirtier than the others? Yes.

3. Have students line up the items from least dirty to most dirty.

ASK: Which items are still clean? *None*.

ASK: Why? Because an item cannot be clean if it is dirty. It is either dirty or clean; it can't be both.

4. Transition to the lesson.

In our lesson today, we are going to study God's holiness. When we say God is holy, we are saying that God is perfectly pure, clean, and without sin. God cannot tolerate sin. If He had even a tiny dab of sin, or pretended sin was no big deal, He would not be holy. Let's explore God's Word and study God's holiness a little more.

Option 2—Light vs. Dark

Gather

- Shoebox.
- Scissors.

Steps

- 1. Before class, cut a small hole in the lid or side of a shoebox. Write "God is light, and in Him is no darkness" inside the shoebox on the bottom.
- 2. Display the shoebox and have students take turns looking through the hole in the box.

ASK: What do you see inside the box? *Darkness*.

It would be cool if we could open the box and take the darkness out to get a better look at it. Let's try to do that.

3. Open the box quickly and stick your hand in it as if you are trying to grab the darkness before it disappears. Do this several times. Ask students to try it too.

ASK: Why can't we grab the darkness and take it out of the box? The light from the room floods the box. Darkness and light cannot be in the same place at the same time.

4. Point out the phrase in the bottom of the box.

The phrase written in the box is based on 1 John 1:5.

READ: 1 John 1:5.

In this verse the apostle John described God by comparing Him to light. His description of God tells us that God has light and no darkness.

5. Transition to the lesson.

God's "light" is His holiness. To be holy means to have no sin. That means there could not be even one sin in God. He is perfect and totally separate from sin. We will learn more about God's holiness in our lesson for today.

Bible Study

Gather

- Teaching picture 96-1.
- Poster 96-A; cut apart strips A1—A4.
- Craft jewels.
- Red food coloring.
- Water in a clear glass.
- Chair (optional).
- White sheet (optional).

I. The Origin of Satan

DISPLAY: Poster strip 96-A1.

If God is holy and everything He does is right and good, then where did wrong come from? The Bible tells us sin began long ago, even before Adam disobeyed in the Garden.

DISPLAY: Poster strip 96-A2.

Long before God created the earth, God created thousands, maybe even hundreds of thousands of beautiful angels to fill Heaven. Each angel had a job to do. All the angels loved their creator and worshiped and served Him. One angel was more beautiful than all the rest. His name was Morning Star or Lucifer.

READ: Ezekiel 28:13–15a.

ACTIVITY: Spread out the craft jewels on the table or floor in front of you. Or give a handful of jewels to each student. Discuss the names of the various jewel colors (e.g., ruby, emerald, topaz, sapphire).

ASK: What did Lucifer look like? *Perfect in beauty. Covered with every precious stone.*

DISPLAY: Poster strip 96-A3.

Can you imagine your body being entirely covered in jewels? How spectacular! Lucifer was stunning. (Collect the jewels from the students.)

ASK: Where did Lucifer live? (You may need to reread verse 14 or have students look up verse 14 for themselves.) *Lucifer lived on the holy mountain of God, walking in the midst of fiery stones—or in the presence of God Himself.*

Lucifer was in charge of guarding God's holiness, and he lived in the very presence of God! He had it all: beauty, wisdom, respect, and greatness. He was not as wise or great as God, but Lucifer was an amazing angel.



READ: Ezekiel 28:15b, 17a.

ASK: What happened to Lucifer? He became proud because of his great beauty.

Lucifer's heart became proud because of his exceeding beauty and wisdom. The Bible says sin was found in him. Pride caused Lucifer to think too highly of himself. The more he thought about how wonderful, wise, and beautiful he was, the more proud he became. Pride caused

Lucifer to decide he would become greater and more powerful than God. Lucifer decided that he should be worshiped instead of God.

DISPLAY: Move poster strip 96-A3 above poster strip 96-A1.

READ: Isaiah 14:13 and 14.

ASK: How did Lucifer start each of his five statements? "I will."

Lucifer said, "I will go to the highest heaven. I will make myself a throne above God! I will rule over all! I will be higher than the clouds. I will be like the Most High God!" In that moment, Lucifer sinned against God. It was the very first sin and the beginning of all sin.

III. God's Punishment of Sin

ASK: How do you think God felt about Lucifer's sin? Sad to see His glorious Creation make such a wicked choice; angry at the sin.

God is holy. He hates anything that goes against His holiness. Pride, selfishness, and arrogance all go against God's holiness. Only God is holy and worthy of worship. Only God deserves to be ruler over all. God is the creator!

READ: Fzekiel 28:16.

ASK: How did God punish Lucifer's sin? God cast him out of Heaven.

DISPLAY: Remove poster strip 96-A3.

ACTIVITY: Show a clear glass of water.

God is holy. He is completely perfect and pure. Heaven is perfect and pure. All the angels God created are holy and pure. Then Lucifer sinned.

ACTIVITY: Drip one drop of red food coloring into the glass. Do not stir or shake it. Let the red color slowly bleed into the water as the students watch.

ASK: What happened to the clean, pure water when I put the red coloring in? It spread into the rest of the water and stained all the water red.

The water is no longer clean because of the red coloring. When Lucifer sinned, he was no longer holy and pure.

ASK: Why did God have to cast Lucifer out of Heaven? *God cannot* tolerate sin.

God could not permit Lucifer to live in Heaven any longer, just like light cannot exist with darkness. God is light. So God cast Lucifer out of Heaven.

Lucifer also lost his beautiful name. He was no longer called "Morning Star." Now he is called Satan or the Devil.

DISPLAY: Poster strip 96-A4, separately (below poster strips 96-A1 and 96-A2).

What happened to Satan is not just a story. He is not a character in a cartoon with a pitchfork and red horns. He is very real. He is a spirit, without a permanent body. The Bible says that Satan roams the earth like a hungry lion, looking for someone he can "devour" or trap in sin (1 Pet. 5:8). Satan did not lose all his power when God cast him out of Heaven. As God's enemy, Satan fights against everything that is right, good, pure, holy, or pleasing to God. He hates God and does not want anyone else to love, worship, or serve God.

IV. God's Standard of Holiness

It is important for us to try to understand God's holiness. We must take God's holiness very seriously. We must study God's Word, the Bible, and attempt to get a glimpse of God's purity. When we do, we will see just how unholy we are and how desperately we need a Savior. There are only a couple of humans who have ever seen a tiny glimpse of God's holiness. One of those men was Isaiah the prophet. Let's take a moment to study his reaction to God's holiness.

ACTIVITY: Students will narrate and act out the scene in Isaiah 6:1–5 as a dramatic or choral reading. You may want to place a chair in the middle of the room and drape a white sheet over it. Select four students to be narrators and position them behind the chair. Select several students to play the Seraphim and Cherubim and place them on either side of the chair. Select one student to be Isaiah and position him in front of the chair. Guide students as they read their parts from their Bibles.

Narrator 1: (Read Isaiah 6:1.)

Narrator 2: (Read Isaiah 6:2 and 3a.)

Seraphim: "Holy, holy, holy is the LORD of hosts!"

Cherubim: (echo) "Holy, holy, holy is the LORD of hosts!"

Seraphim: "The whole earth is full of His glory!"

Cherubim: (echo) "The whole earth is full of His glory!"

Narrator 3: (Read Isaiah 6:4 with much drama.) Act out the shaking of an earthquake.

Isaiah: Falls to his knees, shielding his eyes from the light. (Read Isaiah 6:5.)

DISPLAY: Teaching picture 96-1.

ASK: How do you think Isaiah reacted to seeing God's holiness? *He probably fell to his knees or even on his face.*

Once Isaiah got a glimpse of God's holiness, he helplessly crumbled to his knees. He said, "Woe is me!" or "How sad am I!" "I am undone" means "I am completely destroyed." He could not stand before a holy God. Isaiah realized how completely impure he was compared to God's holiness.

Conclusion

God's holiness is a necessary part of Who He is. One way we can respond to God's holiness is to praise Him. That's what the angels who guarded God's holiness did. They cried out night and day, back and forth to each other, "Holy, holy, holy is the LORD of hosts!"

The other way we should respond to God's holiness is to be like Isaiah. Once we see how holy, perfect, and pure God is, we suddenly realize how sinful, wrong, and impure we are. We can never measure up to God's holiness.


READ: Romans 3:23.

We all fall short of God's glory. We are helpless, hopeless, and desperate. Our sin cannot possibly come anywhere near such a holy God! We could never do enough good things to equal the goodness and holiness of God. That is why we so desperately need a Savior. That is why God had to reach down and save us. The holy God sent His holy Son, Jesus, to give His perfect, holy life in exchange for our sin. Jesus shed His holy blood to wash away the sin that separates us from God so that we might be pure and blameless in God's sight. Amazing! If you have never confessed to God your sin and your need for a Savior, you can do that today. You can put your hope and trust in the shed blood of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sin. And you can know for sure that you are forgiven and promised a home in Heaven forever.

Steps

- 1. Before class, cut out the jewels from the poster.

- 3. Instruct students to look up 1 Timothy 1:17 in their Bibles.

READ: 1 Timothy 1:17 in unison.

ASK: Who is the King? *God.*

Not only is God the king, the rule-maker, and the master over everything, but He is also eternal. He has no beginning and no end. God is immortal. He does not have a body that keeps him in one place; He is a spirit. And He is invisible, the perfectly wise, all-knowing God.

ASK: According to the end of this verse, what should our response be to God? *To give Him honor and glory forever and ever.*

To give God glory is to give Him all the credit and praise for everything. It is to magnify Him and make Him bigger in everything we do and say.

- 4. Distribute the verse segment jewels in random order. Using their Bibles, students should work together to put the jewels on the crown in the correct order. Once completed, read the verse aloud together.
- 5. Repeat the activity as time allows.
