The Big Question

How can God have no beginning?

The truth that God could have no beginning makes us scratch our heads. That's because we exist in time, meaning our lives have a beginning, middle, and end. We have no frame of reference for imagining what an eternal (or timeless) existence could be like. It's sort of like trying to imagine a new color that we've never seen before. Since our frame of reference is limited, there's just no way for our brains to grasp what a new color would look like, or what a timeless existence would feel like.

But whether we can wrap our minds around it or not, God really is eternal! And that means He never had a beginning. This is true because time itself had a beginning, being created by God (Genesis 1:3–5). That means God Himself must exist outside of time, for only a timeless being could create time. Think of a painter. He has to be outside of his canvass in order to create the painting on the canvass. And so it is with God and time. This is why the Bible teaches that God has a different perspective on time than we

do (Psalm 90:4; 2 Peter 3:8). Just as He is over and above the universe, He is also over and above time itself.



Case in Point

Now and Eternity

Brent has grown up going to Sunday School just about every Sunday. He

doesn't mind church, but he doesn't see the need to be so worried about trying to obey God every moment of every day. Sometimes he likes to hang with his friends and just be a regular guy instead of a Christian. He doesn't guard what he says or watches. He joins whatever his friends are doing or saying.


