It's Him, Not Me

I bowed wy head and closed my eyes, just as the speaker had asked. My heart was racing and my hands were sweaty. What if he asked, "Is anyone not sure of his salvation?" Would I raise my hand? Or would I just sit there and hope for the invitation to end?

This scene took place over and over again—in church, at camp, even during an evangelistic roller-skating party! Why couldn't I feel sure that I was a Christian?


When I was four, I asked my mom and dad if they'd show me how to be saved. I had listened to many Bible stories, and had even asked about salvation before. But this time, my parents thought I really understood.

They explained what it means to be saved, and I knelt beside their bed and prayed.

As early as second grade, however, I started to have doubts. I sometimes had bad thoughts. When I did, I'd wonder, Can I be a Christian if I'm thinking these things?

If someone asked me to give my testimony or asked how I'd become a Christian, I really struggled. I'd think, Am I really saved? Did I truly repent? Was I sincere when I prayed? Would God ever take eternal life away from me?

It's not that I didn't try. I did devotions faithfully. I was active in my youth group and went on missions trips. I attended



I went to people for counseling. My mom, my dad, even camp counselors and evangelists tried to help me or give me verses to cling to.

I thought I could get victory over my doubts by praying another "salvation prayer" and making sure I had repented. So I did—several times. I'd feel better, for a while. But then I'd start struggling with sin or analyzing my salvation experience—and the doubts would return.

Finally, one Sunday as I sat listening to the pastor's sermon, I remember thinking that I just needed to tell God that I am trusting Him for my salvation. I didn't need to try to become righteous; I just needed to trust God to be true to what He had said.

Later in my room, I thought about God's plan of salvation. Then I knelt by my bed and told God I believed that Jesus had died for me and my sin and that I was trusting Him to save me. I was so happy and peaceful! I wrote the date on a 3 x 5 card followed by these words: "Tonight, prompted by Pastor's message and based on John 6:37, 44, and 65, I put my

complete trust in Christ and stopped trying to gain my own righteousness. I believe His promises."

That prayer became a milestone in my experience as a Christian. Now when doubts come, I go back to the time when I know I put my trust in what Jesus did for me by dying for my sin.

And do you know what I'm learning? I'm learning that my salvation does not depend on me. Romans 6:23 says that "the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." If my eternal destiny depended on something I had done to earn it or keep it, then it wouldn't be a true gift.

I did not seek God on my own. Romans 3:11 states that "there is none that seeketh after God." He drew me to Himself. Jesus said, "No man can come to me, except the Father which hath sent me draw him" (John 6:44). He promised, "Him that cometh to me I will in no wise cast out" (John 6:37).

Salvation was as simple as realizing my need for a Savior and accepting that Jesus died in my place, for my sin, for me.

Jesus said, "Verily, verily [truly, truly], I say unto you, He that believeth on me hath everlasting life" (John 6:47). That's a trustworthy promise!

I find that if I dwell on myself and my own sinfulness, doubts begin to close in around me. But when I focus on God's loving promises and His power to save, those doubts flee.



Jesus said, "My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me: And I give unto them eternal life; and they shall never perish, neither shall any man pluck them out of my hand. My Father, which gave them me, is greater than all; and no man is able to pluck them out of my Father's hand" (John 10:27–29).

Saved:

When a person becomes a Christian, God delivers (or saves) him or her from sin's guilt, penalty, and control. He also delivers him or her from eternal punishment in Hell (Romans 3:19–26; 6:17, 18, 23; 8:1).
