Children and the Nature of Angels

Snow angels, angel ornaments, angel-shaped jewelry, angel food cake. The list goes on and includes TV programs, music, and movies. Thinking about angels makes us feel comforted and secure. This quarter there are multiple appearances of angels. Our Christmas unit includes the appearance



to Mary, the appearance to Joseph, and the appearance to the shepherds. In unit 2 Jacob sees angels ascending and descending from Heaven on the ladder.

Pre-Primaries are at that age when they think about and begin to question the stories and images they don't understand. So do we, but as adults we often just accept that there are angels and don't really think too much about them. With so much emphasis on the supernatural in our society today, we need to be knowledgeable about what is truth and what is fiction.

Children are not always that interested in the details, but they want and deserve truth. They may ask a question about angels this week and then not ask about them for a couple weeks. However, that does not mean they are not thinking about them. Here are some questions and answers that might help you as you teach about angels this quarter.

Do angels have names? Apparently they do. We know of two mentioned by name in the Bible: Gabriel, who appears in three of our stories this quarter. He brings messages to people. And Michael, who is the archangel and the highest-ranking angel.

How many angels are there? More than can ever be counted (Heb. 12:22).

Where did they come from and why? God made them to serve Him (Ps. 148:5). They are not in human bodies; they are spirits. They were not born; they do not get old or sick; and they will not die. They are stronger than men, but not as strong as God. There are no baby angels. People who die do not become angels.

What do they do? They praise and worship God all the time. The angels that appeared to the shepherds sang. They always do specific things. God tells them what He wants them to do and say. They walk and talk just like us. Mary talked for a long time with Gabriel when he came to her. Remember that the angel told both Mary and Joseph to name God's Son, Jesus (Matt. 1:20; Luke 2:13). Some are messengers; some protect us. They watch us (Ps. 91:11) and know when we become believers in Jesus. They are wiser than humans but not as wise as God (Matt. 24:36). They do not get married, and they do not have children (Matt. 22:30).

What do they look like? They are not men or women; they are spirits. But sometimes Bible people saw them in dreams. The shepherds saw them as a bright light in the sky. Usually, they looked like men when people like Mary saw them.

Do angels have wings? Some angels have wings. Angels called seraphims have six wings. But those are special angels who guard God's throne. Some angels have four wings. Most angels are not seen with wings. They just appear.

Should I pray to angels? No. We only pray to God. God is above the angels. We are to worship and obey only Him.

Will I ever be an angel? No. God made you as a human, just like Adam and Eve. But you, too, were made to worship and praise God.

Will I see an angel? Probably not, though they are around us all the time. But when Jesus comes back, people will see angels with Him (Matt. 25:31).





Christmas Star Party

Planning a Christmas party for your Sunday School class is not easy when you have so many other activities to attend to. This Christmas star party will make your students feel special. Lesson 5 in this winter quarter is the story of the wise men. Schedule a star party between lessons 4 and 5 to emphasize the Bible account.

If you have a large pre-primary department, ask other pre-primary teachers to join you in making this event special. Plan to use a classroom close to the church kitchen if you decide not to have the party in your own home. Read through the following activities and note what preparations you need to make ahead of time. If you decide to bake star cookies, you will want to have the dough mixed up and divided before the party begins. For game prizes, give star stickers or star ornaments.

As the children arrive, give each one a yellow cardboard star to sit on (also use the stars for a game). When all the children have arrived, read a Christmas story of your choice or retell the story of the wise men. Invite a teen to dress as a wise man and tell his story.

Cookie Bake

Make a batch of sugar cookie dough and divide it, putting enough dough in a ziplock bag for each child to make one star-shaped cookie. Keep the dough refrigerated until the activity. Help the children roll out the dough and use cookie cutters to make the shapes. Bake the cookies and set them aside to cool while the children play Christmas star games.

Star Art

If you decide to have students just decorate the star cookies, bake them in advance of the party. Provide white or yellow frosting and a variety of sprinkles, cinnamon candy, colored sugar, and decorating tubes. Make sure each child has a few damp paper towels to clean up his hands. Provide small paper plates and plastic wrap

for students to take their cookies home. As the children work, talk about how God led the wise men to find Jesus. Let them express how the wise men might have felt as they traveled and then found Jesus.

Musical Stars

Play musical chairs, using Christmas music and the cardboard stars. Put a star on each chair. Instead of removing a chair when the music stops, remove a star. The person who sits on the last star is the winner.

Pin the Star on the Tree

Make a poster of a large Christmas tree. Prepare a star for each child with his name on it. Put a loop of masking tape on the back of each one. Blindfold each student in turn and have him place his star as close to the top as possible.

Pass the Star

Cut out stars from yellow tissue paper. Form two teams and give each child a spring clothespin. Give the first person on each team a tissue paper star. At the signal, he must pass the star to the next team member, using only the clothespin. The team to finish passing the star first is the winner. If students drop the star or tear the star, their team must start over.

Star Bingo

Make Bingo cards with different colors, sizes, or designs of stars. (Look for various sticker designs.) Make individual star cards to hold up so students can match the star you show to the one on their cards.

Hosting a party for young children can be exhausting, but it also can be very rewarding. Your students will remember and talk about the star party for a long time. The emphasis on the wise men will make the upcoming lesson unforgetable. This activity will also give you an opportunity to meet parents who do not usually attend your church.



Unit Bulletin Boards



Unit 1

Before the first unit begins, make a bulletin board display using 3" red letters (RBP; 8511) for the title: TO YOU IS BORN A SAVIOR. Place as shown on the sample. Place a piece of yellow construction paper cut to fit behind the letters that spell YOU. This will emphasize that Jesus, the Savior, was born for each of your students. Add a red scalloped border (RBP; 8538). From the resource CD, enlarge and print flannelgraph figure 43-25 (manger scene) to place on the other side of the board.



Unit 2

Before lesson six, remove the unit 1 bulletin board. Use a dark backing and use the yellow scalloped border (RBP; 8539) to make a half bulletin board. Use the 3" yellow letters (RBP; 8513) to make the title: THE PROMISE. The teaching picture focus for this unit is 43-5 (Jacob's Ladder). Jacob is third in the line of God's promise. The picture will initiate a lot of discussion among students.



Unit 3

The five lessons of unit 3 comprise the story of Joseph. Use a yellow backing with the yellow scalloped border and red letters (see above). At the top of the board place the title: JOSEPH TRUSTED GOD. Print the following teaching pictures from resource CD #1243: 43-6, 7, 8, 10, 12, 14. These comprise the overview of Joseph's life from prince to slave to prince again. Overlap as necessary to display on the board.

"Of old you laid the foundation of the earth" (Psalm 102:25, ESV).

Teacher Preparation

To prepare for this week's lesson, read the Scripture Focus several times, thinking on Jesus as eternal God. As we head into the Christmas season, your young students will be excited by lights, gifts, decorations, and the music of Christmas. Your job as their Sunday School teacher is to share with them the doctrinal truth behind the Christmas story.

Preschoolers love babies. Fours and fives are beginning to realize that they are growing up and can do so much more than a baby. Help your students see that there is more to Christmas than the baby in the manger. Guide them into the truth that the baby in the manger is eternal God, the Creator of the universe and the Savior.

Your students fully understand the concept of celebrating a birthday. However, they have a misconception that Jesus had a beginning, simply because He was born. Help them realize the truth that Jesus is eternal and that He existed in time past, before His arrival on this earth.

Transition from Sunday School

Snack Time

- 1. Students should use the restroom and wash hands.
- 2. Reinforce the truth that Jesus was with God in the creation of the earth. Provide animal-shaped snacks (fish crackers, graham cracker bears, gummy dinosaurs [whales, butterflies, etc.]), flower-shaped cookies, star-shaped cereal. Let each child tell about his favorite thing that Jesus made. Serve with apple juice. Talk about the juices made from fruits that Jesus made.
- 3. Choose students to distribute napkins, serve the snacks, and pray.

Guided Play

Guided Play is designed for children to explore the concepts in the Bible lesson for themselves. You may choose to use these ideas or create more of your own. You may prefer to set up stations that the students can choose from as they finish their snack, or you can conduct one of these activities as a group.

Option 1—Nativity Set

Gather

 Preschool nativity sets (unbreakable), more than one for a large class.

Steps

- 1. Display all the items needed for a traditional nativity scene.
- 2. Let students touch and handle the pieces. Talk with the students about each piece.
- 3. Ask students what they know about each character in the Christmas story. This will help you ascertain what your students already know and what they still need to learn.
- 4. Work together to set up the scene and discuss each figure and the role he/she plays in the Christmas account. Remember that the wise men were not at the stable. Therefore, the star is not there either. There is also no mention of angels at the stable.

Option 2—Cotton Swab Art

Gather

- Black construction paper.
- Tempera paint in various colors.
- Paper plates.
- Cotton swabs.
- Table covers and smocks, if desired.

Steps

- 1. Before class, cover the work space and pour tempera paint on paper plates.
- 2. Provide each student with a sheet of black construction paper and cotton swabs.

Teacher Tip

Invest in a good unbreakable nativity set that your students can touch and use for years to come. Playmobil and Fisher Price have excellent sets. During the unit 1 lessons, leave the nativity set out for the students to explore each week.

- 3. Demonstrate how to make stars and planets by dabbing the cotton swab in paint and then creating shapes with each little dot of paint.
- 4. Encourage students to use a new cotton swab each time they use a new color.
- 5. Let students create their own planets and stars. Don't worry about accuracy of colors.
- 6. Be sure each student writes his name on his star painting.

Option 3—Instrument Center

Gather

• A set of preschool instruments (homemade or store-bought). (See page 52 for ideas.)

Steps

- 1. Distribute the instruments. Make sure there is one for each child.
- 2. Sing several Christmas carols or choruses together while playing instruments.
- 3. Encourage students to trade instruments for each new song.
- 4. Let students suggest their favorite Christmas songs and choruses to sing.

Bible Study Review

For your convenience, you will find the same Bible lesson that was taught in Sunday School printed below. Review the key points as you interact with the students. Use your open Bible as you teach and read directly from Scripture when appropriate. Encourage the students to interact with your lesson by asking questions.

Jesus Is the Eternal Creator (John 1:1–4, 14, 15, 18; Heb. 1:1–3; Col. 1:15, 16)

Gather

- December calendar with Christmas Day circled in red marker.
- Birth certificate.
- Baby footprints or baby pictures (optional).
- Verse poster 43-A (resource kit #1243).
- Resource 43-R2 ("Long Before" rhyme) from resource CD or student book page 6.



Invest in a durable set of preschool instruments. Preschoolers love music, and you will find many ways to use them throughout the years.

ASK: Show calendar. What month is it? *December.*

ASK: What very exciting, important holiday do we celebrate in December? *Yes, Christmas!*

ASK: Why do we celebrate Christmas? What is Christmas really all about? *The birth of Jesus, our Savior, God's Son.*

We all love Christmas. It is such a wonderful time to celebrate. We love talking about how God sent Jesus, in the form of a tiny baby, to be born here on earth. We love singing songs like "Silent Night" and "Away in a Manger." We love the lights and the manger scenes. Everyone loves a sweet, little new baby!

ASK: Where was Jesus, and what was He doing before He was born in a stable and laid in a manger-bed? (Let students discuss. Their responses will help you get a glimpse of what your students might already know or what their preconceived notions are.)

God's Word tells us exactly where Jesus was and exactly what He was doing before He came to earth.

Listen closely as I read two verses that sound very much alike.

READ: Genesis 1:1 and John 1:1.

ASK: What did I say two times? *In the beginning.*

DISPLAY: Verse poster 43-A. Point to Genesis 1:1 on the poster.

We have learned that God is eternal. God does not have a beginning. God does not have an end. No one made God. God has always been. We also learned that in the beginning, God made heaven and earth. God is the creator.

John 1:1 calls Jesus "The Word." (Point to "the Word" in the verse and read it.)

ACTIVITY: (On the board, write: "The Word" = Jesus.) This time when I read the verse, I am going to say "Jesus" instead of "the Word" to make it easier for us to understand. (Do so.)

REPEAT: Listen again. (Read verse 1 again.)

ASK: Where was Jesus? Jesus was with God.

In the beginning, Jesus was with God, His Heavenly Father. He has always been with God. He is God's Son.

READ: John 1:3.

ASK: What did Jesus do? He made everything. Nothing was made without Him.

43-A (ESV)

(Point back to Genesis 1:1 on the verse poster.) Jesus was in the beginning. Jesus is the designer, the creator, the builder of the universe and everything in it! Jesus is God's Son, therefore, He is God. When we read "In the beginning, God created the heaven and the earth," we could also read "In the beginning, [Jesus] created the heaven and the earth." Jesus and God both created the world at the same time.

READ: Colossians 1:16.

Because Jesus is God, Jesus had no beginning, and He will have no end. That is very hard for us to understand. Everything we know here on earth had a beginning. Each of us had a beginning.

ACITIVITY: Show your birth certificate.

This is my birth certificate. It is a legal document that tells who I am, who my parents are, when I was born, and where I was born.

ACTIVITY: Point to and read all the important information on your birth certificate. Let the students hold it and look at it. If you have the hospital footprint or a newborn picture for the students to see, they will enjoy seeing you as a baby.

Jesus was born on earth. But that is not the day Jesus started. Jesus lived forever in Heaven with His Heavenly Father long before He came to earth. Jesus lived in eternity long before He ever made the earth or the sky or the green grass or the animals. Jesus is God.

READ: John 1:14.

ASK: What did we say "the Word" was another name for? It is a name for Jesus.

In John 1:1 and 14, we learn that "In the beginning was [Jesus] and [Jesus] was with God and [Jesus] was God." "[Jesus] became flesh and dwelt among us." That means Jesus left the glories of Heaven and took on the form of a tiny baby. He grew up to be the Savior of the world!

ACTIVITY: Point to John 1:14 on the verse poster. Read the words. Move your finger down to the manger scene below. Read Psalm 102:25.

EXPLAIN: The words "Of old" mean a long time ago. The words "to lay the foundations" mean to create. We could say, "A long time ago You, Jesus, created the earth."

DISPLAY: The calendar with December 25th circled in bold, red marker.

December 25th is the day we celebrate Jesus coming to earth to be born as a baby so that He could give His sinless life on the cross to be our Savior. Jesus is God. He came because of His great love for us.

- 4. Why did God send Jesus to earth? To die on the cross for our sin and rise again as our Savior.

NOTE: For the next few weeks students will make crafts to contribute to a class bulletin board display. Use an actual bulletin board, or design a space on the wall with a dark blue section of bulletin board backing or several large sheets of poster board. Use brown construction paper strips to make a stable (see page 24). The class will add to the display each week. Today students will work together to make the border. This chain will remind them of the deity and eternality of Christ.

Gather

- Red and green construction paper.
- Glue sticks.
- Christmas stickers and foam stickers (optional).

Steps

- 1. Before class, put up the backing and make (draw) the stable outline in the designated area. Cut red and green construction paper widthwise into $1\frac{1}{2}$ -inch strips.
- 2. Provide paper strips and a glue stick to each student.
- 3. Show students how to make a paper chain section with the strips.
- 4. Let students use stickers to decorate the chain.
- 5. Join the sections so the chain will go around your bulletin board in one continuous loop.
- 6. Have students help you attach the chain. Do not let students climb on chairs.

ASK: Can you identify the beginning of this chain? How about the end? *No, once it is all connected, there really is no beginning or end.*

ASK: What did we learn about Jesus today? *Jesus is God. Jesus is eternal.*

This chain is going to be the border of our Christmas display. This chain will help us remember that the baby in the manger is more than just a sweet baby: He is the eternal Son of God. He has always been with God, and He always will be.

Clean Up and Say Good-bye

Gather

- Strong Kids Music CD Vol. 1.
- Students' crafts and student book pages.
- Strong Kids at Home take-home paper and cover wrap for each student.

Steps

- 1. Enlist the students to help clean up the craft area and your classroom.
- 2. Give each student a copy of *Strong Kids at Home* take-home paper for students and the cover wrap (for parents). The take-home paper has additional activities for parents to do with their children as a way of reinforcing the lesson and measuring spiritual growth. Make a point of showing students the craft on the back this week's paper. It is a good reminder that Jesus left Heaven to become our Savior.
- 3. If time allows, sing "To God Be the Glory" (track 25).
- 4. Close in prayer and thank each child for coming to church today.
- 5. Sing the "Good-bye Song" to the tune "If You're Happy and You Know It."
