He could hear his classmates getting up. "Just two more sentences. I'll do them fast," he promised himself.


He thought for a minute. "The orange sun made the grass . . ."

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God's Word Is Powerful!

Hiding God's Word

Jesus fought Satan's temptations to sin with God's Word. But He didn't have to sit down and look through the Old Testament to find the right verse at the right time—He had already memorized it!

Psalm 119:11 says when you "hide" or "store up" God's Word in your heart, it helps you not to sin. To hide God's Word in your heart means to memorize and think about it.

Play a game of "hiding" God's Word with your family this week. Choose a memory verse from Sunday School or look up a verse you may want to memorize. Write out that verse on a notecard and hide it somewhere that one of your family members might find it (e.g., in a drawer, taped on a mirror, under a pillow).

When someone finds the verse card, it's his or her turn to hide it again. Do this all week long.

Measuring Growth

The Primary lesson for this week covered the account of Jesus' temptation in the wilderness. Your child learned both doctrinal and practical truths. First, we see Jesus' sinlessness in the face of temptation. Second, this account demonstrates to your child the best defense against sin: prayer and God's Word. Teach your child to turn to God in prayer when struggling with sin. Help your child recall Bible verses that apply to the situation.

Measurables

Look for the following indicators that your child understands that Jesus is the sinless Savior.

- 1. My child recognizes that Jesus is sinless.
- 2. My child understands that if Jesus was not perfect He could not be our Savior.
- 3. My child seeks God's help through prayer when tempted to sin.
- 4. My child memorizes Scripture verses to recall when tempted to sin.

Jesus Proved His Sinlessness

Matthew 4:1-11







Jesus was alone in the wilderness, fasting and praying. He had not eaten or drank for forty days. He was tired and hungry.

Satan saw that Jesus was alone and hungry, so he decided to tempt Jesus to sin. If Jesus sinned, He would not be perfect, and then He could not be the Savior from sin. Satan wanted to stop God's plan to provide salvation.

"If You are the Son of God, make these stones into bread," Satan said to Jesus. Because Jesus is God, He had the power to make stones into bread. But He would not do what Satan said to do to prove He is God.

Jesus told Satan, "It is written that man shall not live by bread only, but by every word of God." Jesus used God's Word to answer Satan's temptation.

Satan did not give up. He took Jesus to the top of the temple. "Throw Yourself down from this high place. God's angels will protect You," Satan said. But Jesus was not tricked by Satan's temptation. He answered with God's Word again.

Then Satan took Jesus up on a very high mountain so they could see all the kingdoms of the world.

Satan said, "I will give You all of this if You will worship me."

Again, Jesus resisted Satan's temptation. He said, "It is written, you should worship and serve only God. Go away, Satan!"

Satan had no power over Jesus because Jesus is God. God cannot sin. By resisting Satan's temptations to sin, Jesus proved He is sinless and perfect.
