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


Sunday School Teacher Guide



The teacher guide contains thirteen interactive lessons for the Sunday School hour. Every part of the lesson material incorporates the theme. The Teacher Preparation helps you prepare your heart for teaching the lesson. Read the

Scripture text, BuildUP theme, and Measurable Response each week so you know the focus of the lesson. Note the Gather list in every section of the lesson. Gather the items in the list so you are prepared for the activities. Some come from the kit but others will come from your home or will need to be purchased. If you have Junior Church, a separate teacher book is included for that hour, but the lessons and activities coordinate with the Sunday School hour. Both hours share the same Bible account visuals.

Attendance and Verse Sticker Chart



The attendance and verse chart are combined. Students place

an attendance sticker each week to mark their

attendance and help complete the scene. The verse recognition sticker will be added in the designated square when the student recites his verse the week after it is taught. Note that there is only one sticker sheet and one chart in the kit box. Order additional sets for your class. They come in packets of five.

Session Starters

Every lesson has two Session Starters that help set the tone and lead into the Bible story. Choose the one that is most compatible with the age and ability of your class.


Transition

Use this clean up time as an opportunity to sing and recite verses as students prepare to go to Bible study time.

Bible Study

The Bible Study section of the lesson forms the core of your time with your class. Prepare through the week. Read the lesson through at one sitting. The second time you read, have all the visuals you need and hold them up as you read aloud. The next time you look at the lesson, do not read it. Be prepared to tell it and use the visuals as you do so.

In the kit box, you have a **Bible Picture Book**



with fourteen teaching pictures. The pictures provide good opportunities to talk with your students about important points in the Bible accounts. In addition, there are **flannelgraph** sheets. Punch out all the flannelgraph at the beginning of the quarter.

Consider putting the flannelgraph pieces in Ziplock bags or in envelopes to keep them from getting lost. Also consider mounting your flannelgraph pieces on cardstock, cutting them out, and gluing a craft stick to the back of the pieces. Make the pieces stand by pushing the craft sticks into a tub of sand or gravel.

Memory Builder



There are three sheets of verse or activity **posters**. Cut these apart before the unit begins. Some

posters will be cut apart again for use in discussion or review. If so, directions are given in the teacher book. There are usually teaching and review activities and games included in this section.

Session Application

During the Session Application, students will complete the workbook page that coordinates with

the lesson. There is one sample **student book** in



your kit. Order a student book for each student in your class. Plan to make a completed sample page each week, especially if there are flaps to fold or parts to cut and glue. Students like to see what the final picture will be. A sticker page

is attached to each book. To prepare for the quarter, you might want to take apart all the books and make files of pages by week. Cut apart the stickers for each week, store them in an envelope for each week, and file with the pages. This saves time during class.

Take-Home Papers



At the end of the session, distribute the **take-home paper** to each child. There is one sample in the kit. Order a set for each student. One set is thirteen papers, one for each week of the quarter. The student book and the take-home paper carry

the theme of the lesson into the home. These also help the parent know what their child is learning.

Resource CD



Your kit box contains a **resource CD** which has all the patterns
needed for both Sunday School and
Junior Church. In addition, there
are individual teaching pictures

and flannelgraph figures. All the verse posters are included. There is also a file of clip art containing various poses of Timber, the beaver mascot for the series. He appears throughout the take-home paper and can be used to decorate your classroom.

The CD is an important tool. You may want to print verse posters to cut apart instead of using the original. You will also use printed teaching pictures and flannelgraph to make the bulletin boards. Pattern resources may include songs, coloring pages, patterns for art, pictures for discussion activities, recipes, and more. Note: There is a download code included on the CD jacket if you do not have CD capabilities on your computer.

The DVD



Included in the kit is a **DVD** of animated review stories. These are recommended for the Junior Church time. Not every lesson has a DVD story. Some of the presentations

will cover more than one lesson. Stop the DVD at the end of what you have covered in one lesson. Continue it the following week.

Michael and Emily Storybook



The Michael and Emily Storybook is a book of application stories for use in the Junior Church hour. It is included in your resource kit. Thirteen stories and pictures are included. The story is also included in the Junior Church Teacher Book each week. The

pictures are also on the resource CD. You can use them to decorate your room or let students use them to retell the story at home.

There are a lot of materials available to help you make Sunday School a meaningful and memorable experience for pre-primaries. Use them to teach God's Word and make a difference in your students' lives.



Unit Bulletin Boards


Unit 1

The unit 1 theme is faithfulness. Lessons on Ruth and Hannah focus on loving others and loving God. Cover the board with a yellow background. Add a scalloped leaves border (available from RBP; order no. 8540). Use 3" red letters for the title: FAITHFUL (EZ letters; order no. 8511). Center the title on the board as shown. Print the following teaching pictures from the resource CD: 46-2 and 46-3; mount as shown. Use flannelgraph figures 46-20, 46-25, 46-18, 46-26, and 46-28 to make a mural on a sheet of 12" x 18" construction paper as shown. Talk about the faithfulness of these women throughout the unit.



Units 2, 3, and 4

These three units comprise nine lessons on the first kings of Israel. Use the scalloped rainbow border (order no. 8541) with blue backing. Use 3" yellow letters for the title: FIRST KINGS (order EZ letters 8513). Print the following teaching pictures from the resource CD: 46-5 (SAUL), 46-7 (DAVID), 46-11 (SOLOMON). Mount the pictures in sequence. Print the kings' names on word strips. Mount as shown.

Teacher Preparation


Read the Scripture Focus, Ruth 1. We live in a self-centered society that emphasizes "me first." The idea of looking out for others is fine if it uplifts, brings attention to, and fits into the schedule of the participant.

And no one is more egocentric than toddlers and preschoolers! You will see it in a dozen little ways every day. Preschoolers want to be first in line, first to be served, have first choice, and have all the teacher's attention. It is a vivid display of that old sin nature. Your students need multiple reminders each day to take turns, share, help, and put others first, none of which is natural for any of us.

Ruth made a bold and sacrificial choice. She left her home, her family, and her religion. The Bible doesn't tell us the details, but Ruth must have learned about the One true God from her husband and in-laws. Realizing that the Lord is the One and only God, she sought to make Him "her God." She put her trust in Him and reached out to Naomi in compassion.

Attendance and Verse

Distribute an attendance and verse chart to each student. Have students write their names on their charts. Today the students will place the apple tree sticker over the 1. Mount the charts on the wall or bulletin board at the students' eye level. Next week, students will add a pumpkin sticker to their charts for saying Proverbs 17:17, the memory verse for this week.



Session Starters

Option 1—Looking Out for Others

Gather

- Small plastic bags and hand sanitizer if picking up trash (optional).
- Small brooms and dust pans.

Steps

1. Take your class on a walk around your church (inside and/or outside). Before you set off on this walk, explain the purpose of your excursion.

Today we are going to go on a walk. But this isn't just a walk for fun. I want you to be on the lookout for others! Look for a way you can help or serve someone else, even if you don't see anyone.

ASK: What are some very simple things you might do to be helpful while we are on our walk? (Get your students to suggest things like pick up trash, pick up sticks on the sidewalk, hold the door for others, carry something for someone, straighten up a messy bookshelf, sweep leaves off a sidewalk.)

As we walk, think about what you are doing. Are you running ahead of the teacher? Are you pushing to be near the front of the line? What can you do for your classmates that is "looking out for others"?

- 2. Praise students who find ways to help others. Encourage students to keep their "helping eyes in focus" as they walk.
- 3. Return to the classroom and discuss how the students helped others.
- 4. Transition to the Bible lesson.

Gather

Steps

- 1. Teach the action rhyme and motions on resource 46-R1.
- 2. Talk about looking for things to do to help others.
- 3. Transition to the Bible lesson.

Transition

- 1. Instruct students to help you clean up.
- 2. Sing a transition song, such as "I'll Be a Helper" (resource 46-R2) as you work. The tune is to "Jesus Loves Me."
- 3. Guide students to your story time area for the Bible lesson.
- 4. Students fold their hands and bow their heads. Ask God to help the students learn. Thank Him for Sunday School.

Bible Study

Ruth's Selfless Love (Ruth 1)

Gather

• Flannelgraph figures 46-15—46-22.

(Place flannelgraph figures 46-15—46-17.) Elimelech, his wife Naomi, and their two sons were Israelites. They worshiped the one true God.

Elimelech and his family lived in Bethlehem. One year, Elimelech's crops did not grow. No crops grew because there was no rain. The corn and wheat and barley plants dried up and died. There was no food for the people or their animals. This is called a famine.

Elimelech heard that there was good land and food in the country of Moab. The people of Moab did not worship the One true God; they worshiped idols. But Elimelech's family needed food. They packed up their belongings and moved to faraway Moab.

ACTIVITY: Role play walking to a new land. Walk in a large circle around your classroom or walk in place.











Naomi and Elimelech were happy in Moab. Their boys grew up into tall, handsome young men. They had everything they needed.

Then something sad happened. Elimelech died. (Remove 46-16.) Naomi's sons had lost their father. The sons continued to work and take care of the crops. The sons married two beautiful girls from Moab. Their names were Ruth and Orpah. (Add 46-18 and 19 to the board.)

Years went by. Then both of Naomi's sons died! (Remove 46-17. Move 46-18 and 46-19 closer to Naomi.) Now Naomi was old and all alone. What would she and her two daughters-in-law do? Who would care for them? They were all widows. A widow is someone whose husband has died.

ASK: How do you think Naomi, Ruth, and Orpah felt? Sad, lonely, scared.

But God had not forgotten about Naomi. He had a plan to take of her.

One day, Naomi said to Ruth and Orpah, "I am going back to Bethlehem. There is nothing here for me. My husband and sons are dead. I have heard that the crops there are growing again. I have a house and land there. You are both young and beautiful. You can find new husbands here."

But Ruth and Orpah loved Naomi. They decided to go Bethlehem with her. (Replace 46-18 with 46-20. Add bundles 46-21 and 22 to Orpah and Naomi.)

ACTIVITY: Stand and walk in place.

After walking awhile, Naomi stopped and said, "I don't want you to go with me. Please, go back to your families."

READ: Ruth 1:14.

Orpah decided that maybe Naomi was right. She left Naomi and Ruth and walked back to her home of Moab. (Remove 46-19 [Orpah]. Give 46-21 [bundle] to Naomi.)

"Ruth," Naomi said. "You go too. I am old. I am sad and bitter. Go home."

"Please don't ask me to leave," Ruth pleaded. "I will go wherever you go. Your home will be my home. Your family will be my family. Your God will be my God."

Ruth had learned about the one true God from her husband and Naomi. She put her trust in God, not idols.

ACTIVITY: (Do a finger play to review the story so far. Have students hold up 4 fingers on the right hand.) Four people moved

to Moab: Naomi, Elimelech, and their two sons. **ASK:** What sad thing happened? *Elimelech died.* (Put one finger down.) **ASK:** What happy thing happened next? *The boys married Ruth and Orpah.* (Put two more fingers up.) Now there are five happy people. **ASK:** But what happened? *The two boys died.* (Put down two fingers.) And Orpah decided to go home. (Put a finger down.) Only Naomi and Ruth went on to Bethlehem.

Naomi saw how much Ruth loved her and wanted to stay with her. Naomi was glad Ruth chose to stay with her. Now she would not be lonely.

Naomi and Ruth walked on to Bethlehem. The men were gathering the grain in the fields. There was a good harvest. God was pleased that Ruth had shown love to Naomi by staying with her.

Memory Builder

Gather

• Verse poster 46-P1 (Proverbs 17:17).

Steps

- 1. Hang poster 46-P1 or put it on a table for the students to see.
- 2. Read Proverbs 17:17 from the poster as you point to each word.
- 3. Discuss the pictures on the poster.

ASK: Who is a friend? Can Moms and Dads be friends? Can brothers and sisters be friends?

- 4. Have each student choose a picture and make up a story about what is happening and how someone in the picture is being a friend. For instance, two brothers have been swimming. It is cold. Only one brother brought a towel. What will a friend do? How will the other brother feel?
- 5. Teach sign language for the word "friend." Recite the verse to each other using the sign.

Gather

- Lesson 1 student book page; sacks and hearts stickers.
- Coloring and writing supplies.

Steps

- 1. Direct students to the tables. Provide a workbook page and stickers for each child.
- 2. Provide necessary art supplies for the students to complete the page.
- 3. Read the directions and discuss the elements on both pages.
- 4. Guide students as they work. Encourage them to complete both sides. On page 2, help students identify what kindness the children are choosing to do. Help them identify what some pictured children need to do to show kindness.
- 5. Review the "friend" sign and repeat Proverbs 17:17.
- 6. Distribute any crafts students made and the Strong Kids at Home take-home paper and outer wrap (for parents) to students who are leaving at this time.
