# What's in Your Kit Box?

Welcome to Year 2 of Strong Curriculum for preprimaries. This material is developed for children in preschool and kindergarten (ages 4, 5, and 6). Take time to familiarize yourself with the materials in your resource kit box as you read this article.

### **Sunday School Teacher Guide**



The teacher guide contains thirteen interactive lessons for the Sunday School hour. Every part of the lesson material incorporates the theme. The Teacher Preparation helps you prepare your heart for teaching the lesson. Read the

Scripture text, BuildUP theme, and Measurable Response each week so you know the focus of the lesson. Note the Gather list in every section of the lesson. Gather the items in the list so you are prepared for the activities. Some come from the kit but others will come from your home or will need to be purchased. If you have Junior Church, a separate teacher book is included for that hour, but the lessons and activities coordinate with the Sunday School hour. Both hours share the same Bible account visuals.

# Attendance and Verse Sticker Chart



The attendance and verse chart are combined. Students

place an attendance sticker each week to mark their

attendance and help complete the scene. The verse recognition sticker will be added in the designated square when the student recites his verse the week after it is taught. Note that there is only one sticker sheet and one chart in the kit box. Order additional sets for your class. They come in packets of five.

### **Session Starters**

Every lesson has two Session Starters that help set the tone and lead into the Bible story. Choose the one that is most compatible with the age and ability of your class.


### **Transition**

Use this clean up time as an opportunity to sing and recite verses as students prepare to go to Bible study time.

### **Bible Study**

The Bible Study section of the lesson forms the core of your time with your class. Prepare through the week. Read the lesson through at one sitting. The second time you read, have all the visuals you need and hold them up as you read aloud. The next time you look at the lesson, do not read it. Be prepared to tell it and use the visuals as you do so.

In the kit box, you have a **Bible Picture Book** 



with fourteen teaching pictures. The pictures provide good opportunities to talk with your students about important points in the Bible accounts. In addition, there are **flannelgraph** sheets. Punch out all the flannelgraph at the beginning of the quarter.

Consider putting the flannelgraph pieces in Ziplock bags or in envelopes to keep them from getting lost. Also consider mounting your flannelgraph pieces on cardstock, cutting them out, and gluing a craft stick to the back of the pieces. Make the pieces stand by pushing the craft sticks into a tub of sand or gravel.

# **Memory Builder**



There are three sheets of verse or activity **posters**. Cut these apart before the unit begins. Some

posters will be cut apart again for use in discussion or review. If so, directions are given in the teacher book. There are usually teaching and review activities and games included in this section.

## **Session Application**

During the Session Application, students will complete the workbook page that coordinates with

the lesson. There is one sample **student book** in



your kit. Order a student book for each student in your class. Plan to make a completed sample page each week, especially if there are flaps to fold or parts to cut and glue. Students like to see what the final picture will be. A sticker page

is attached to each book. To prepare for the quarter, you might want to take apart all the books and make files of pages by week. Cut apart the stickers for each week, store them in an envelope for each week, and file with the pages. This saves time during class.

# **Take-Home Papers**



At the end of the session, distribute the **take-home paper** to each child. There is one sample in the kit. Order a set for each student. One set is thirteen papers, one for each week of the quarter. The student book and the take-home paper carry

the theme of the lesson into the home. These also help the parent know what their child is learning.

### **Download Card**



Your kit box contains a **card with an online download code** which has all the patterns needed for both Sunday School and Junior Church. In addition, there are individual teaching pictures and flannelgraph figures. All the verse

posters are included. There is also a file of clip art containing various poses of Timber, the beaver mascot for the series. He appears throughout the take-home paper and can be used to decorate your classroom. The downloads are important tools. You may want to print verse posters to cut apart instead of using the original. You will also use printed teaching pictures and flannelgraph to make the bulletin boards. Pattern resources may include songs, coloring pages, patterns for art, pictures for discussion activities, recipes, and more.

### The DVD



Included in the kit is a **DVD** of animated review stories. These are recommended for the Junior Church time. Not every lesson has a DVD story. Some of the presentations

will cover more than one lesson. Stop the DVD at the end of what you have covered in one lesson. Continue it the following week.

The Michael and Emily Storybook is a book of application stories for use in the Junior Church hour. It is included in your resource kit. Thirteen stories and pictures are included. The story is also included in the Junior Church Teacher Book each week. The



# Unit Bulletin Boards


#### Unit 1

# Ruth's Selfless Love

Ruth's selfless love for Naomi

### **Scripture Focus**

Ruth 1

### **BuildUP Theme**



**UPLIFT OTHERS** 

God wants us to think of others above ourselves.

# **Measurable Response**

The students will look for ways to put others first.

# **Memory Verse**

"A friend loveth at all times" (Proverbs 17:17).

# **Teacher Preparation**

Read Ruth 1. We live in a self-centered society that emphasizes "me first." The idea of looking out for others is fine if it uplifts, brings attention to, and fits into the schedule of the participant.

And no one is more egocentric than toddlers and preschoolers! You will see it in a dozen little ways every day. Preschoolers want to be first in line, first to be served, have first choice, and have all the teacher's attention. It is a vivid display of that old sin nature. Your students need multiple reminders each day to take turns, share, help, and put others first, none of which is natural for any of us.

Ruth made a bold and sacrificial choice. She left her home, her family, and her religion. The Bible doesn't tell us the details, but Ruth must have learned about the one true God from her husband and in-laws. Realizing that the Lord is the One and only God, she sought to make Him "her God." She put her trust in Him and reached out to Naomi in compassion.

# Transition from Sunday School

# **Snack Time**

- 1. Children should use the restroom and wash hands.
- 2. Serve cracker snacks. Show box fronts. Talk about farmers who grow grain to make the crackers.
- 3. Choose students to help distribute napkins, cups, the snack. Ask a volunteer to pray. Talk about how serving others is a way of being kind.

# **Guided Play**

Guided Play is designed for students to explore the concepts in the Bible lesson for themselves. You may choose to use these ideas or create more of your own. You may prefer to set up stations that the students can choose from as they finish their snack, or you may conduct one of these activities as a group.

# **Option 1—Finger Puppet Play**

#### **Gather**

- Resource 46-R21.
- Coloring supplies.
- Children's and teacher's scissors; tape.

### Steps

- 1. Before class, print a copy of resource 46-R21 for each student. Make sample puppets.
- 2. Students color and cut out the characters. Help younger students with cutting.
- 3. Help students tape the sides of the finger puppets together.
- 4. Use the puppets to role-play the conversation and action between Naomi, Ruth, and Orpah. It is best to have Naomi on one hand and Ruth and Orpah on the other hand. NOTE: Students may also move puppets on the tabletop.


# **Option 2—May I Serve You? (Kitchen Center)**

#### **Gather**

- Secure children's play kitchen items (play food, utensils, pots and pans, dishes).
- Placemats or small tablecloths.

### **Steps**

- 1. Encourage the children to pretend to make and serve a meal in a restaurant. Other students are customers.
- 2. Encourage them to act out excellent service by listening closely to the order, serving with care, asking the customers if they need anything, and being polite.
- 3. After a few minutes, switch roles.

### **Option 3—Action Rhyme Review**

#### **Gather**

Resource 46-R1.

### Steps

- 1. Teach the action rhyme (resource 46-R1). If students practiced the rhyme in the Sunday School hour, let them teach others.
- 2. Discuss.

**ASK:** What things might you see to do to help others? (Let students act out what they might see and do.)

**ASK:** How might you use your arms to show kindness to someone? (Students give suggestions like carry things, pull a wagon with a younger child, push a swing, open a door for someone).

# **Ruth's Selfless Love (Ruth 1)**

(Place flannelgraph figures 46-15—46-17.) Elimelech, his wife Naomi, and their two sons were Israelites. They worshiped the one true God.

Elimelech and his family lived in Bethlehem. One year, Elimelech's crops did not grow. No crops grew because there was no rain. The corn and wheat and barley plants dried up and died. There was no food for the people or their animals. This is called a famine.

Elimelech heard that there was good land and food in the country of Moab. The people of Moab did not worship the one true God; they worshiped idols. But Elimelech's family needed food. They packed up their belongings and moved to faraway Moab.

**ACTIVITY:** Role play walking to a new land. Walk in a large circle around your classroom or walk in place.

Naomi and Elimelech were happy in Moab. Their boys grew up into tall, handsome young men. They had everything they needed.

Then something sad happened. Elimelech died. (Remove 46-16.) Naomi's sons had lost their father. The sons continued to work and take care of the crops. The sons married two beautiful girls from Moab. Their names were Ruth and Orpah. (Add 46-18 and 46-19 to the board.)

Years went by. Then both of Naomi's sons died! (Remove 46-17. Move 46-18 and 46-19 closer to Naomi.) Now Naomi was old and all alone. What would she and her two daughters-in-law do? Who would care for them? They were all widows. A widow is someone whose husband has died.

**ASK:** How do you think Naomi, Ruth, and Orpah felt? *Sad, lonely, scared.* 

But God had not forgotten about Naomi. He had a plan to take care of her.

One day, Naomi said to Ruth and Orpah, "I am going back to Bethlehem. There is nothing here for me. My husband and sons are dead. I have heard that the crops there are growing again. I have a house and land there. You are both young and beautiful. You can find new husbands here."

But Ruth and Orpah loved Naomi. They decided to go Bethlehem with her. (Replace 46-18 with 46-20. Add bundles 46-21 and 46-22 to Orpah and Naomi.)

**ACTIVITY:** Stand and walk in place.

After walking awhile Naomi stopped and said, "I don't want you to go with me. Please, go back to your families."

**READ:** Ruth 1:14.

Orpah decided that maybe Naomi was right. She left Naomi and Ruth and walked back to her home of Moab. (Remove 46-19 [Orpah]. Give 46-21 [bundle] to Naomi.)

"Ruth," Naomi said. "You go too. I am old. I am sad and bitter. Go home."

"Please don't ask me to leave," Ruth pleaded. "I will go wherever you go. Your home will be my home. Your family will be my family. Your God will be my God."

Ruth had learned about the one true God from her husband and Naomi. She put her trust in God, not idols.

**ACTIVITY:** (Do a finger play to review the story so far. Have students hold up 4 fingers on the right hand.) Four people moved to Moab:

Naomi, Elimelech, and their two sons. **ASK:** What sad thing happened? *Elimelech died.* (Put one finger down.) **ASK:** What happy thing happened next? *The boys married Ruth and Orpah.* (Put two more fingers up.) Now there are five happy people. **ASK:** But what happened? *The two boys died.* (Put down two fingers.) And Orpah decided to go home. (Put a finger down.) Only Naomi and Ruth went on to Bethlehem.

Naomi saw how much Ruth loved her and wanted to stay with her. Naomi was glad Ruth chose to stay with her. Now she would not be lonely.

Naomi and Ruth walked on to Bethlehem. The men were gathering the grain in the fields. There was a good harvest. God was pleased that Ruth had shown love to Naomi by staying with her.

• Michael and Emily Storybook.

### The Visiting Baby

Emily and Michael came home from school and suddenly stopped and stared. A baby was in their living room! She was happily chewing on a teething ring.

Then Mommy came in. "I see you have met Olivia."

Emily laughed and ran to play with the baby.

**DISPLAY:** Show picture 46-ME1.

"Is it ours?" asked Michael. He was a bit concerned.

Mommy laughed. "No, silly. It's not our baby. This is Olivia Roberts."

"Good," Michael said. "When does she leave?"

"Her big brother is having surgery today," Mommy informed them. "Mr. and Mrs. Roberts need to be at the hospital with their son. They needed someone to care for Olivia. She will be here a day or two, depending on how her big brother recovers."

"Oh wow! Two whole days!" Emily was delighted.

Mommy said, "I will need help taking care of Olivia."

Emily said she would love to help, but Emily had no idea how to care for a baby.

- 2. How did Michael and Emily feel about the baby? (They did not like having her at their house. She cried a lot and took all of Mommy's time.)
- 3. What did Michael and Emily learn about love? (Love is wanting the best for others and being willing to serve and help.)

# **Application Craft**

### **Hands of Friendship**

#### **Gather**

- White copy paper.
- Colored construction paper.
- Pencils and coloring supplies.
- Scissors.
- Glue sticks.

### **Steps**

- 1. Before class, make a sample project. Write the memory verse, Proverbs 17:17, on the bottom of each piece of construction paper. Older students may trace over your printing.
- 2. Pair students together. Students will trace each other's hands on the copy paper, color them, and cut them out. They will print their names on both hands.
- 3. Students will trade one hand each. Each student needs one right and one left hand.
- 4. Demonstrate how to weave layer the hands. Glue the palms down on the construction paper, like the two hands are holding hands.
- 5. Students print names on their papers.
- 6. Encourage students to say "thanks for your help" to their partner and work to clean up the craft area together.
