I hope you have a great time here at Kookaburra Coast! (Exits.)

INTRODUCTION TOUR TIME!

Ian enters quickly, looking around.

Sydney:	It'll just take a moment.
Ian:	Oh, all right.
Sydney:	Okay—what has a long tail and pointy ears and wakes everybody up at five in the morning?
Ian:	<i>(Puzzled.)</i> What has a long tail and pointy ears and wakes everybody up at five in the morning? I have no idea.
Sydney:	A kangaroo-ster! (Laughs as a "kangaroo-ster" appears.) Get it? Kangaroo-ster! Oh, that one's a classic.
Ian:	Sydney, you're the craziest kookaburra I know.
Sydney:	Thank you very much.
Ian:	Now then, Sheila is going to be here anytime with our special guests, so-
Sydney:	Special guests? What sort of special guests?
Ian:	Two kids who live <i>way</i> over there <i>(motions)</i> on the other side of the ocean. This is the first time they're visiting Australia. They've decided to spend their visit helping with our tour groups here at Kookaburra Coast.
Sydney:	Oh, that sounds exciting! And they won't have heard any of my jokes before. They'll be a brand-new audience for me to try out all my material on.
Ian:	Now, Sydney, I don't want you pestering them with jokes all the time. They're here to help and learn about all the glorious things in the Land Down Under.

Sydney:	Don't worry, Ian. I won't tell them too many jokes. Just a couple hundred.
Ian:	(Shocked.) A couple hundred!
Sheila, Gwen,	and Joey enter.
Sheila:	A couple hundred what, Ian? Is that how many kangaroos you spotted out in the bush today?
Ian:	No, I was just telling Sydney to take it easy on the jokes with our guests here. <i>(Motions to Gwen and Joey.)</i>
Gwen:	Kangaroos? Are there kangaroos nearby? How amazing!
Joey:	I can't wait to see some for myself.
Ian:	There are plenty of roos in this area. You'll get many chances to see them later on.
Sheila:	(Introducing the kids.) Everyone, this is Gwen.
Gwen:	<i>(Matter-of-factly.)</i> I reported on Australia for my school project. I got an A and extra credit too!
Sydney:	What was the extra credit for?
Joey:	She wore a koala costume for the presentation.
Gwen:	The costume was itchy, but the extra credit made it worth it!
Sheila:	And this gentleman here is Joey.
Sydney:	(Puzzled.) Joey? He doesn't look like a joey to me.
Joey:	What do you mean? What's a joey supposed to look like?
Sydney:	Well, most joeys I've seen have tails and fur and ride around in their mother's pouch.
Sheila:	(Jumping in.) What Sydney forgot to tell you is that "joey" is what we call a baby kanga- roo. So we don't say "momma kangaroo and her baby"; we call them "a momma and her joey." (Kangaroo and joey appear.)
Joey:	Well, I'm obviously not a baby kangaroo, but I am a good jumper. Watch! (Joey jumps up and down.)
Sydney:	Speaking of jumping, do you know why the cantaloupe jumped into the pool? Because it wanted to be a <i>water</i> -melon! <i>(Laughs.)</i>
Ian:	(Shakes head.) Oh, Sydney. That joke was just—
Sydney:	Hilarious! I know!

Ian:	Um, not exactly.
Sheila:	Don't mind Sydney. She's a laughing kookaburra, so she's always telling jokes.
Gwen:	(Looking around.) So, what exactly do you folks do here at Kookaburra Coast?
Ian:	<i>(Excited.)</i> I'm glad you asked! We run Kookaburra Coast Tour Company. <i>(Motions to the cutout jeep if it is onstage.)</i> We give tours to show people all the beautiful examples of God's glory here in Australia.
Sheila:	This land is full of amazing things. <i>(A picture appears of Australia's natural wonder.)</i> Some of the plants and animals in Australia aren't found anywhere else in the world!
Ian:	And all of them were created by God. They show how great His glory is.
Joey:	Glory? What's that mean?
Gwen:	"Glory" means something is honored or magnificent. <i>(Pauses.)</i> So Australian plants and animals show that? I mean, they show how great God's magnificence is?
Sheila:	That's right, Gwen! And God's creation gives Him honor because it shows us just how good and great He is.
Sydney:	Wow! Gwen is pretty smart!
Gwen:	I read most of the dictionary when I was in second grade.
Joey:	(With mild sarcasm.) Well, good for you. I think I'll just wait to see that epic dictionary movie they're working on.

Everyone except Sydney laughs.

Ian:	See there, Sydney? Now <i>that</i> was funny.
Sydney:	It was? I don't get it.
Sheila:	Well, we'd better show you two to your rooms so you can unpack and get some rest. You must be tired after that long flight.
Sydney:	What long flight? (Motions to Joey and Gwen.) Gwen and Joey don't have wings.
Sheila:	Oh, Sydney, don't be silly. Come on, you two.

Everyone starts to exit.

Sydney:	Hey, Joey and Gwen, do you know what has a long tail and pointy ears and wakes everybody up at five in the morning?
Ian:	Sydney, what did I say about too many jokes?
Sydney:	(Pleading as the voices trail off.) It's just one joke for now
