Why does God rely on people to be His witnesses?



Heaven resounds with angels' joyful voices. They love Jesus and perfectly obey His commands to do His will on earth. They are powerful too. In the future, the archangel Michael and the good angels will battle Satan and his fallen angels. Michael will succeed in kicking Satan and his followers out of Heaven (Rev.

12:7–10)! So why didn't Jesus send His angels to earth to be His witnesses? It seems they could do a much better job than humans have done so far.

An angel will come to earth as God's witness during part of the Tribulation (Rev. 14:6, 7). Until that time, however, Jesus chose to use people so they might reap the benefits of sharing the gospel around the world. Nothing brings joy in this present life like witnessing to a person who responds and trusts in Jesus as his or her Savior. Jesus wants us to know that joy on earth!



A First-century Tsunami



On December 26, 2004, a colossal earthquake with over a 9.1 magnitude shook Indonesia and triggered a tsunami that killed nearly 240,000 people. The devastating waves traveled 11,500 miles east to Peru and nearly 14,000 miles around Africa to Nova Scotia, Canada. The waves brought destruction and despair around the world.

During the first century A.D., the Holy Spirit arrived and triggered a wave of power that still reverberates nearly 2,000 years later. The Spirit came to live in believers. Christ has been building



His church through Spirit-empowered believers ever since. The results, though, couldn't be more different than those of tsunami waves. Countless souls have been rescued from eternal death and given the hope of eternal life.

Memory Verse—Acts 1:8

Acts 1:8 serves as an outline for how the book of Acts was written and how the gospel spread to the known world of the first century. At Pentecost, the church exploded into existence in Jerusalem as many believed the good news of Jesus Christ. Then believers carried the message throughout the regions of Judea and to Samaria. As the Holy Spirit continued to empower believers, the gospel spread to various countries, bringing many people into a right relationship with God. The gospel is still spreading today.
