How does God express His wrath today?



During the end times God will pour out His wrath (Rev. 6:16, 17; 19:5), but where is His wrath today? In an unjust world full of violence and corruption, it's easy to wonder why God doesn't rain down immediate punishment.

God loves us, so He doesn't always punish sin immediately—and we should be glad that He doesn't. He wants every person to be saved and desires that no one

should perish (2 Peter 3:9). So, through Jesus, He provided deliverance from His final judgment (1 Thess. 1:10) and continues to give people opportunities to repent. He is withholding His full wrath because of His love for humanity. But we can see His partial wrath expressed even now.

At the final judgment, God's wrath will be final.

All people are born sinners and separated from God. Until people put their faith in Jesus for salvation, they will remain separated from Him. God's wrath is already abiding with, or remaining on, those who don't believe in the Son of God (John 3:36).

God reveals His wrath from Heaven against all unrighteousness (Rom. 1:18) by giving men over to their sins (1:28). In other words, God allows people to suffer the natural consequences of their sinful choices. We see this in the world. The collapse of society under moral decay, for example, is a result of God's wrath.

God has also put into place systems of government to bring about His present wrath (Rom. 13:4, 5). When lawbreakers are punished, God uses that earthly punishment as an instrument of His wrath. Those who receive just punishment still have a chance to repent and be delivered from God's final judgment.

Earthly governments aren't perfect, so not every criminal is condemned. But no one who rejects God will escape His judgment (Rom. 2:5–9). Today, God reveals part of His wrath so that all have a chance to repent. At the final judgment, God's wrath will be final (Rev. 20:15). There will be no escape.

Ancient Sound Science



When Paul talked about the word of the Lord "sounding" from the lives of the Thessalonians, could he have been thinking about the ancient Greeks' ability to create good acoustics?

Although the Greeks didn't fully understand the science of sound, they certainly understood how to manipulate sound. They built outdoor amphitheaters with semicircular rows of seating rising up a hillside and with a center, circular stage at the base of the hill. Some

of the theaters had room for 15,000 people. In the most famous of these, the amphitheater in Epidaurus (pictured), an actor whispering on stage can be heard from the back row—with no amplification.

The perfect acoustics of the theater in Epidaurus remind us to let God's Word sound out clearly from our lives to everyone around us.

Memory Verse—1 Thessalonians 1:8

The Thessalonian believers looked to Paul and Silas as their examples of true followers of Christ. Soon they too became examples for others. Their faithful service for God spoke more powerfully than their words. News of their faith spread throughout their region of Macedonia and beyond. Their faith had become so well known that Paul didn't need to encourage them to share their faith with others.

Measuring Growth



Paul and Silas established the church in Thessalonica during Paul's second missionary journey. Persecutors soon chased them out of town. Later, Paul sent Timothy to check on the new believers. When Timothy returned with a good report, Paul responded with his first letter. He encouraged the new believers by thanking God for evidence of their faith. He praised them for following the Christlike example he and Silas had set for them and for becoming examples themselves. News of the believers' life-changing faith spread as they continued living for Christ and waiting for His return.

Look for the following indicators that you are setting a godly example for others.

- 1. My love for Christ motivates me to serve others.
- 2. My actions reflect the truth of the gospel.
- 3. My attitudes and actions, even in difficult times, demonstrate hope in Christ.
