"According to the Bible, Who created everything?" "God!"

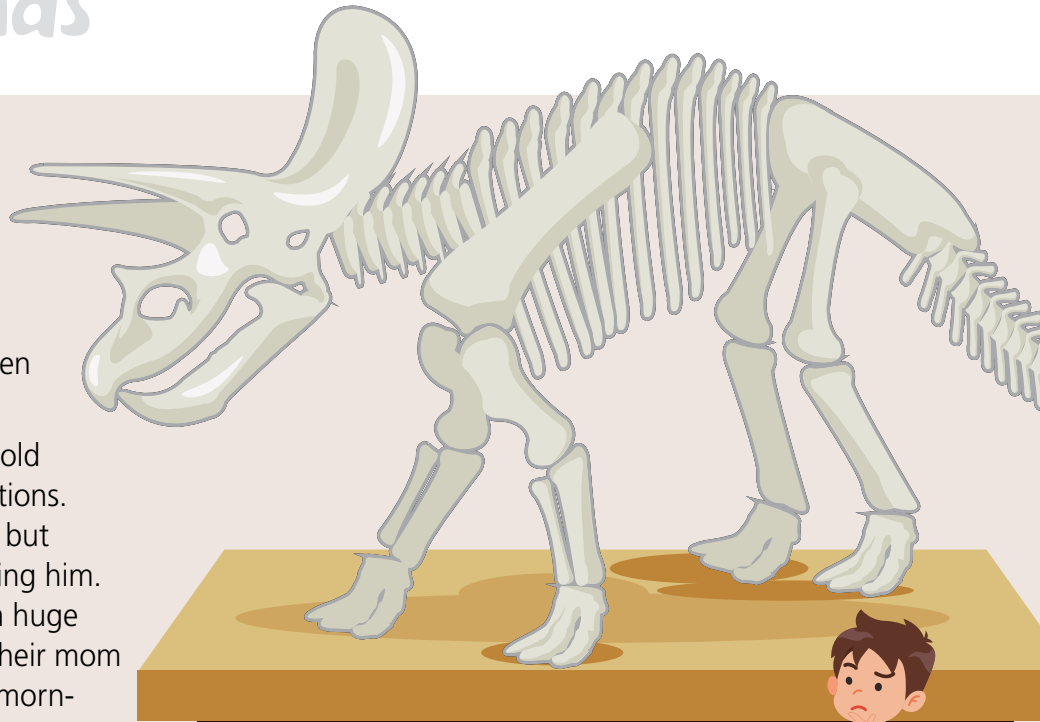
"That's right," Mom nodded. "Jesus, God's Son, created the world and everything in it."

Sarah nodded. "Jesus was born as a little baby in Bethlehem a long time ago. But you said Jesus made the dinosaurs and everything else too."

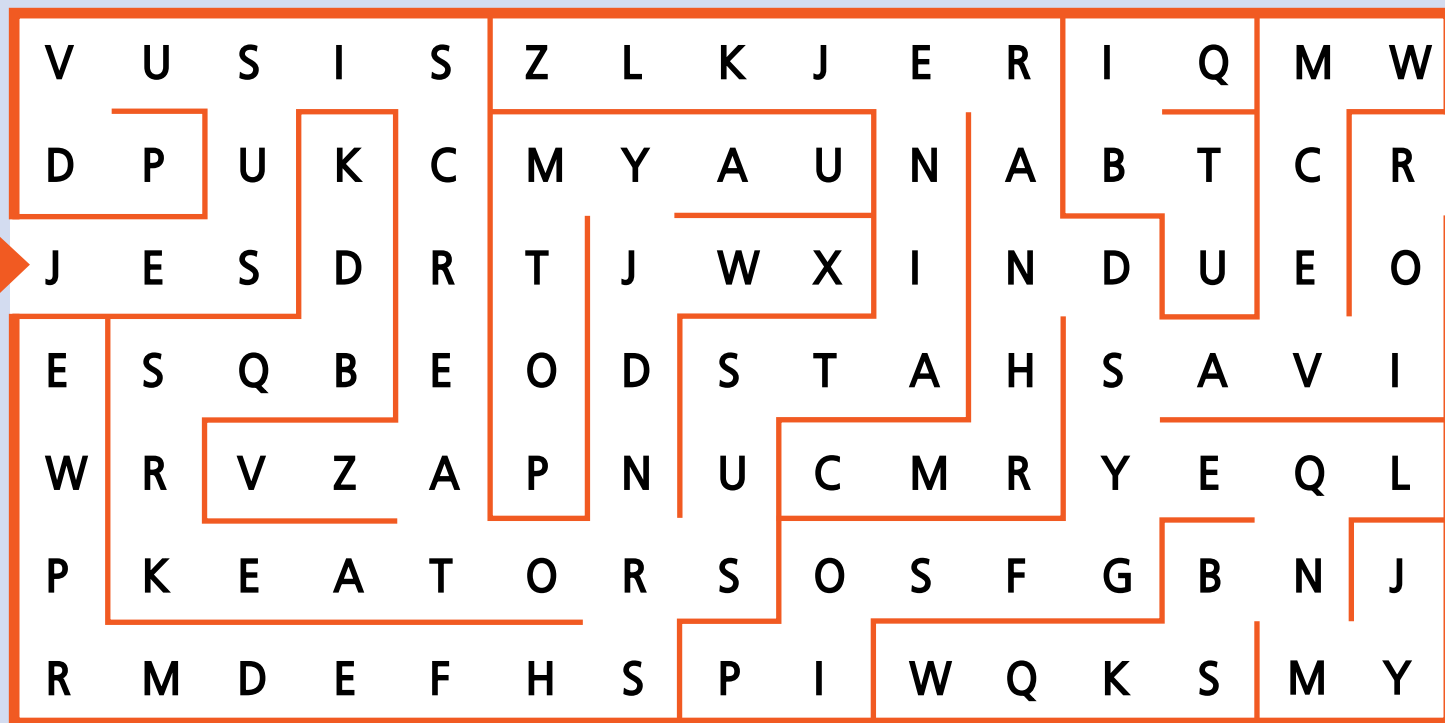
"It's true. The Bible says Jesus was there with God at the beginning and that He created the world."

Growing at Home

Jesus Made It All (John 1:1–4, 14, 15, 18; Hebrews 1:1–3; Colossians 1:15, 16)

The Primary lesson for this week emphasized that Jesus is not just the baby in the manger at Christmastime; He is also the Son of God Who created the universe. Because Jesus is God, He is eternal—He had no beginning and has no end. Jesus’ eternity is difficult to grasp since it is beyond our realm of human experience. Help connect your child’s understanding of the baby Jesus to Jesus as God, creator, and Savior.



Christmas Card Bookmark

Keep this bookmark in your Bible or give it to someone as a gift!

Materials

• Christmas card. • Scissors. • Paper hole punch. • Ribbon.

Steps

1. Cut a 2" strip from a Christmas card. It can be as long as you want it to be.
2. With a paper hole punch, make three holes at one end of the bookmark.
3. Cut three, 6" pieces of ribbon. Fold one piece of ribbon in half and push the loop through one of the holes in the bookmark. Put the loose ends of the ribbon through the loop and pull to secure it to the bookmark. Repeat with the remaining pieces of ribbon.



Measurables

Look for the following indicators that your child understands Jesus is God and the eternal creator of the universe.

1. **My child recognizes that Jesus existed eternally before He came to earth as a baby.**
2. **My child understands that Jesus made the world and everything in it.**
3. **My child worships Jesus as God.**

Jesus Made It All

John 1:1–4, 14, 15, 18; Hebrews 1:1–3; Colossians 1:15, 16



At Christmastime there are nativity scenes everywhere. Pictures portraying Mary, Joseph, and baby Jesus are on Christmas cards, wrapping paper, lawn decorations, and more!

But baby Jesus was more than a cute newborn bundled up in a manger. That baby is God's Son, and He existed long before He came to earth as a baby.

In fact, Jesus has always existed; there was never a time that Jesus did not exist. And He will never end. That's a dif-

ficult concept for us to imagine. Everything on earth has a beginning and an end, but not Jesus.

John 1:1 tells us that "the Word"—Jesus—was with God at the beginning and that He was God. Jesus is eternal because He is God.

What was Jesus doing before He came to earth as a baby? Jesus created the world and everything in it! Even more than that, He is the One Who actively sustains creation, keeping everything going.

Jesus, the Son of God, is the creator and sustainer. When Jesus came to earth, however, He came to be our Savior. While He was here, he lived, walked, served, and taught among us. But ultimately, baby Jesus grew up to be the One Who died for our sins on the cross.

That little baby in the manger, Who we see in the nativity scenes, is the creator, sustainer, and Savior of the world. You can think about that baby, Jesus, all year long. Every time you see a beautiful flower, a majestic mountain, a cute puppy, or even a reflection of yourself in the mirror, remember that Jesus created it all. ■
